IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE WORK OF HIGH SCHOOLS

Details of the New Public School Leaving Fxamination and Other Departmental Regulations.

It has become the custom of our educational authorities to alter and rearrange the various examinations of the province every five years. The last important change, previous to the changes which go into force when the schools resume work for the present year, was the establishment of the public school leaving examination. Mr. Reszin, the inspector for West Victoria, had much to do with the establishment of this examination, and has done much to get the teachers of his inspectorate to take up the work necessary for it. This examination is a grade more difficult than the entrance examination, and the student who succeeds in passing it is entitled to be placed in the second form of a

Collegiate Institute. The changes made by the new regulations are many and important, and we would advise all of our readers who are at all interested in the work of the teaching profession to study these changes very carefully. We purpose in the next two issues to give these changes in full, as it would take up too much of our space for

Two new examinations have been established. These will be held at the different high schools and Collegiate Institutes upon papers prepared by the Central Board of Examiners in Toronto, and examined in Toronto by the regular departmental examiners appointed from year to year. One of these examinations is for students of the first form, and must be taken for promotion to the second form. The other new examination is for commercial certificates. Though these new examinations have been established, yet the total number of examinations is not materially increased, as the junior matriculation and junior leaving examinations are now pracisely alike in every respect. The examinations under the new regulation will be in number, viz. :-First form examination; primary examination; junior leaving examination; senior leaving examination; commercial examination. The department has wisely decided that the new regulations shall not go fully into force for two years, but that for the examinations of 1896 and those of 1897 those teachers who have a certificate of any kind may go on for a higher grade under the old regulations, but for all others the new regulations shall come into force at once ...

The paper on drawing shall test the candidate's knowledge of the principles of model and object drawing as contained in the authorized drawing books, and his skill in drawing from memory any com-mon object or group of objects. Model and object drawing include the type solids, their parts and their application in the drawing of objects, shading and grouping.

The paper on book-keeping shall consist of a set of business transactions involving the use of commercial paper, such as drafts, notes, che ques, etc. The candidate shall make a proper record of these trans sactions by either single or double entry, and close the set of books. He shall also write out any of the commercial forms in full, showing the endorsement. It is expected that in addition he will have to submit his drawing and book-keeping books gior examination.

During the year '96 and '97 the holder of a Commercial certificate passed either this year or any previous year will be considered as having passed the first form

All who write for a primary certificate must pass this first form examination. This may be done the same year that they write upon the primary or any previous year. Primary candidates for next year's examinations who do not hold a primary certificate will require to pass the examina-tion on the subjects of the first form examination, as well as those of the new primary, as the regulations will go into force for primary candidates next year.

Teachers who have primary certificates and who intend to go on for junior leaving certificates, and those having junior leaving certificates who intend going on for senior leaving certificates, should make arrangements for the prosecution of their work before the new regulations come in force. There is a good year's work under the old regulations in either the junior or senior leaving work, but under the new regulations there will be fully two years'

Divers Discloses the Dire Work of Japanese Cruisers.

The Sunken Transport Kowshing an Appalling Sight-Awful Work of Torpedo, Shot and Shell-The Rooms Tween Decks Packed With Bend.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 2 .- Ad vices from Chefoo, received by steamer to-day, say divers have been at work on the Chinese transport Kowshing, sunk by the Japanese cruisers off the Yalu. They report that the vessel is an appalling sight, as she is literally torn to pieces with shot and

There is no doubt of her having been sunk by a torpedo, as there is a large, ragged opening in her port, bilge into an dthrough one of the bunkers. She is riddled all about the water line with big shot holes, from the top of her foremast down to the water line there are the marks of the machine-fire gun.

About half way up the mast, where the riging joins, is badly torn by small projectiles. Probably many poor wretches climbed up there to be shughtered. The mainmast is gone, possibly injured by the firing. Her decks are torn up and splintered throughout, and marks of machine-gun and shell fire cover the ship from end to end. particularly about the funnel casing, which is badly riddled. The 'tween decks are ful lof dead, many of the rooms being packed, especially on the starboard side, where hundreds of poor wretches had crawled to escape, if possible, th pitiless storm of projec-

The North China News comments on this as follows: Any unnecessary sacrifice of life or property is not legitimate warfare. It is barbarous, and *there was not the slightest excuse for sinking this ship. She was a good, safe prize, and could not possibly escape. At the worst, her rudder might have been shot away; but to fire torpedoes, to pound away with shot and shell from two, eight and six-inch guns, to haul down a shower of nitrals from machine guns on a small steamer crowded with human beings, was an act which we need not now characterize.

ORONHYATEKHA RE-ELECTED. Supreme Court I O.F. Chooses Its Officers -Dr. McConnell to Be Buried in Britain.

London, Aug. 3 .- The Supreme Court of the I.O.F. adjourned immediately the sad news of Dr. McConnell's sudden death was made known. A cable from Toronto announced that it was the desire of the friends that the remains be interred in England, and arrangements were thereupon made for the funeral, which will take place on Wednesday, and at which all the delegates will attend.

At the post-mortem examination it was decided that his death resulted from pulmonary apoplexy. The body was removed to the morgue, and a coroner's inquest upon it will be held on Wednesday next. At to-day's session of the Supreme Court of Foresters resolutions expressing condolence with the family of the deceased delegate from Toronto were passed.

The Supreme Court decided during to-day's session to increase the rate of assessment upon new members between the ages of 40 and 49. The salary of the Supreme Chief Ranger was fixed at \$10.000 yearly, that of the Supreme Secretary at \$3000 yearly and that of the Supreme Treasurer at \$2000 per year.
