ON THE FARM.

The Importance of a Record of Farm Operations.

The farmer should study how to produce at the lowest cost and how to seli at the best advantage. His mistakes should serve to guide him against repeating them, and where a farmer has had years of experience has knowledge thus gamed should be as valuable as the capital. A record of the operations of each year, for reference, would be found

When wheat is valued at a low price do not forget that the straw is also an item that is entitled to add something to the value of the wheat crop.

While the low price of wheat and the large production s not encouraging to farmers, et the corn crop is usually three times as large as that of wheat, and farmers continue to make corn a speciality. They do not seek new markets for corn, but sell it in the shape of beef, butter, milk and wool, and yet there is but little mentioned regarding the corn crop as not

Never waste wood ashes. Save every pound, and use them on the orchard land. Corn coas are very rich in potash and the ashes of such should be saved care-

Roses, trees and sarubberry will not thrive on the edges of a grass plot. The grass deprives them of plant food; and prevents growth. They should be set out on a clean location, and well worked with a hoe several times, especially if the season is dry.

It is not costly to add ornamental plants to the farm, and the farm will have a more attractive appearance when a few vines are grown on the dwelling and out-buildings. A hop vine, Virginia creeper, honeysuckle, or even a morning glory, will make a great difference in appearance. The most beautiful farms are those where all the buildings are made to appear as if given extra care and at-

When the new crop of corn is harwested do not begin to feed it out until the whole of the old supply has been consumed. There is quite a difference in new and old corn.

If the drought has injured the pasture the grass will be very snort, and in some sections it may be dead. In such cases it will no better to feed the stock at the the barn, as the animals will do more harm trampling the grass than may be desired. Give the pasture an opportunity to renew itself for spring.





FUNGOUS POTATO DISEASES.

The Blight, Macrosporium Disease and Scale Distinguishing Features and Treatment, The blight attacks the leaves, stems and tubers. Generally the first effect upon the leaves is the appearance of brownish areas, which soon become soft and foul smelling. So sudden is the ap-



LEAF AFFECTED WITH BLIGHT. pearance of the disease in some cases that fields which one day look green and healthy may within the next day or two become blackened as though swept by fire. The rapid spread of the disease is dependent upon certain condition of moisture and heat. A daily mean or normal temperature of from 72 degrees to 74 degrees F. for any considerable time, accompanied by moist weather, furnishes the best conditions for the spread of the disease. On the other hand, if the daily mean or normal temperature exceeds 77 degrees for a few days the development of the disease is checked. This fact explains why the potato blight fungus seldom occurs to any serious extent in section where the mean or normal daily temperature exceeds for any length of time 77 degrees. The macrosporium disease attacks the

leaves and sometimes the stems, but never the tubers. The disease may appear at any time after the plants are from four to six inches high. It progresses slowly, three weeks or more passing before all the leaves succumb. The tubers stop growing as soon as the leaves are attacked.

The effects of potato scab on the tubers are too well known to require description. The first two diseases are often confounded. Fortunately the bordeaux mixture is the most effective remedy for both blight and mascrosporium. For the treatment of scab a solution of corrosive sublimate has given best results. This may be prepared by dissolving 21/4 ounces of corrosive sublimate in about 2 gallons of hot water and after an interval of 12 hours diluting with 13 gallons of water. For blight and the macrosporium dis-

ease apply the bordeaux mixture when the plants are six inches high, and continuing at intervals of 12 or 14 days until five or six applications have been made. If the season is rainy, it is best to make the treatments every 10 days, the object being to keep the plants at all times covered with the fungicide. By adding four ounces of paris green to each barrel of the bordeaux mixture the treatments will not only prevent the disease under consideration, but keep in check the Colorado beetle and other insects as well. Before adding the paris green to the bordeaux mixture the former should be made into a thin paste by mixing with a small quantity of water.
