And Parliament Hill Was Thronged by Citizens in Holiday Dress-Speech From the Throne-The Business of the First Day Was Only Routine.

Ottawa, Aug. 20 .- Probably the largest crowd ever assembled to witness the opening of Parliament was that which turned out to-day. The weather was beautiful, and as it was the Capital's Civic Holiday, hundreds of Ottawa people, who rarely have an opportunity of witnessing the opening or closing of Parliament, took advantage of the occasion. It was three o'clock when the Governor-General reached the Senate Chamber, His Excellency's carriage being accompanied by the usual escort of Dragoons. Entering the Senate Chamber, Lord Aberdeen was accompanied by a brilliant suite, including General Gascoigne, Col. Aylmer, and other officers. Lady Aberdeen preceded His Excellency into the Senate Chamber by a few minutes, being accompanied by Lady Marjory Gordon and her two sons, the latter being arrayed as pages of the time of Louis Quatorze. The chairs, usually occupied by the senators, were filled by a bevy of ladies. It is remarkable how many new faces there were amongst them. Most of them wore high-necked dresses, a few decollete costumes being observable. Black rod having been duly despatchthe members of the lower House came in, preceded by their Speaker and
