teamship Labrador Arrived at Quebec With Her Flags at Half-Mast-The News of His Death Was a Shock to His Friends at

Quebec, Aug. 21.-The R.M.S. Labrador, Captain MacAullay, arrived in port at 7 o'clock this evening. Her flags were at half mast. The vessel proceeded to the G.T.R. wharf at Levis. There was a busy scene on board when the correspondent of the United Press called. Away aft on the starboard side of the twin deck, in an isolated compartment, the body of the late Sir David Macpherson, K.C.M.G., was laid, all dressed, on ice. As soon as the vesse was moored to her berth the G.T.R. steamer Polaris came alongside and placed aboard a handsome metal casket. Under taker Rickaby placed the remains of Sir David in the coffin. Mrs. Banks, daughter of deceased, Mr. William Macpherson, his son, and other friends and relatives viewed the remains and the lid was soldered fast. Sir David left Brown's Hotel, Piccadilly, London, on Aug. 12, for Liverpool, where he joined the Labrador. His health was poor and, though he was not suffering from any particular disease, Mrs. Banks, who accompanied him on the voyage across, tried to dissuade him from starting on the journey, but Sir David was restless and wanted to return home to Canada, and he could not be convinced to stay in England. He embarked on the Labrador on the 13th and she put to sea the same day. The hon, gentleman wah placed in bed, from which he never rose. He grew weaker and weaker every day. Dr. Wright and the ship's medical officer did not apprehend death so carly; in fact, they hoped to reach Quebec without death taking place. Saturday night, the 15th, Sir David's condition became alarming. The pulse was faint and unsettled. Next day brought no change. On the contrary, there was every evidence of the heart giving way. Finally the end came at about 2.30 in the afternoon. Sir David Macpherson passed away quietly and without any

bec to-night. Sir David's Career. Hon. Sir David Lewis Macpherson, K.C. M.G., P.C., was the son of the late David Macpherson, Inverness-shire, Scotland, where he was born Sept. 12, 1818. Sir David Lewis Macpherson comes of an ancient and sturdy Scottish family, and in the markedly successful career which has been his, exhibits the characteristics of his race. Our subject went to school in Scot-land, and completed his education at the Inverness Royal Academy. In 1835, with the thousands of others who were at this turning that faces toward the New World, he set sail, resolved to try his fortune in Canada. Here was a new country, large with promise, and holding out encouraging, nay, beseeching, hands to courage and enterprise. Young Macpherson was just the man for such a field. It would be difficult at this distance to lay hold of every fact which would show the mainsprings of Early in his career he took an earnest interest in public questions, and in 1864, three years before Confederation, at the solicitation of many friends, he offered himself and was successful, for the Saugeen Division, Upper Canada. He held his seat in the old Canadian Parliament as member for Saugeen till 1867, when he was called by royal proclamation to the Senate. He had now amassed much wealth, was prominenty connected with enterprises of national mportance, and stood in high repute among als fellow-countrymen.
