BADE ALL HIS FAMILY FAREWELL

Fnly a Short Time Before the Long Sleep of Death Fell Upon Him-His Career From Newsboy to Crown Adviser-The Cause of His

Poor Health.

Toronto, Aug. 20. A second time has the huge legislative pile in Queen's Park become the death-chamber of a member of the Ontario Government. Hon. W. D. Balfour passed over the bar to the great majority last evening. The Provincial Secretary was surrounded by his loved ones when he breathed his last. The summons came five minutes after o'clock, just as the Minister was in his delirium, vigorously addressing an imaginary audience of his electors.

Yesterday morning Mr. Balfour seemed stronger than he had been for days, and Dr. Fisher of Amherstburg went so far as to hold out hopes of his patient's recovery. Drs. McPhedren and Amyot, the other attendant physicians, however, shook their heads, and thought that the end could not be far off. As the day wore on the dying soon run out. The Minister himself, though from the first he had fought the fatal malady with all the energy whole career, during the afternoon recognized that his time was at hand. He recalled the death a few years ago in the Parliament Buildings of a former Minister of Public Works, and remarked to his attendant, Mr. Samuel Dunbar, that it was going to be a "case of Christopher Fraser."

Then, as the tide of life gradually ebbed, his mind was filled with reminiscences of his early boyhood, and he spoke of how, as a wee lad, he had sold papers on the streets of St. Catharines as a newsboy.

Shortly after 5 o'clock the attendant saw that the hand of death was approaching and summoned the members of the dying man's family to his His father, mother, wife, sisters and eldest son entered the chamber, and the Minister, recognizing each, beginning with his wife, faithful helpmeet, bade them all an affectionate farewell. During these last hours, Rev. Ross G. Murison of Toronto University was also admitted to minister to the spiritual wants of the

Half an hour before the end Mr. Balfour began to sink rapidly, and, when he became unconscious, all retired from the chamber except Dr. Fisher and the male nurse. In the last few moments the Minister essayed several times to rise in his bed and he was speaking in his well-known restless manner when his spirit crossed

It seems especially sad that Mr. Balour should be cut off while comparalively a young man-he had only reached his 45th year-when he had just arrived at the goal which for ears he had been struggling towards. Only the other day he remarked to his his will on Tuesday and it is under-

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An Interesting Bulletin Issued From the O. A. C.

TESTS MADE BY MR. C. A. ZAVITZ.

The Record of Experiments Made During the Past Seven Years With Many Varieties of Winter Wheat-Yield of Wheat and Straw-A Study

for Farmers.

Toronto, Aug. 20. Bulletin 103, just issued by the Ontario Agricultural College, give experiments made are calling for succor and release. by C. A. Zavitz, B.S.A., in winter wheat: One hundred and thirty-three varieties of winter wheat have been tested at the Ontarlo Agricultural College within the last seven years. Of this number fifty-three rieties there have been experiments conducted in different dates of seeding, methods of seeding, selection of grain for seed, quantities of seed per acre, application of fertilizers, sowing of spring grain to act as a mulch for winter wheat ,the yield and quality of wheat cut at different stages of maturity, and the value of seed from wheat cut at different stages of maturity. The field in which the grain was sown in 1896 is a good average clay loam, quite gentle slope towards the southwest. No 1893, when twenty tons per acre of farmproduced a crop of corn in 1893, a crop of grain in 1894, and a crop for green manuring in 1895, which was plowed under in July of that year. No other plowing was to the first of September. The plots were made of uniform size for the different experiments, each containing one one-hun-

The seeding for all the experiments took place in the month of September. The germination was quite satisfactory throughout, and the growth of the wheats in the autumn was good. On examination of the crop in the following April, it was found that many of the varieties showed but little signs of winter killing, while others had been considerably frozen out. thus affording ample data for a compartson of the different plots in respect to

the actual yields of the plots.
The following table gives the average rields for seven rears past:

1-The average results of winter wheat growing on the experimental plots for sevpounds; yield of straw per acre, 2.5 tons; and yield of grain per acre, 38.7 bushels. 2-Dawson's Golden Chaff has given the largest average yield of grain per acre among fifty-three varieties of winter wheat grown at the Ontario Agricultural College for five years; also among eleven leading varieties tested over Ontario in 1893, nine varieties in 1804 and nine varieties in 1805, 3-The Early Genesee Giant has given the largest average yield of grain per acre among twenty-eight new varieties which were tested for the first time in 1894, and have now been tested for three years in succession. This variety also stood second in average yield per acre among nine leading varieties of winter wheat tested over Ontario in 1894, and nine leading va-4-The Early Genesee Giant, Giant Square Head and Queen Meg varieties of winter wheat, which head the lists in av erage yield per acre among the varietie grown for three years, for two years and for one year, respectively, are very simi-

lar in all characteristics. 5-Among eighty-one varieties of winter wheat tested in 1896, the Dawson's Golden Chaff, American Bronze, New Columbia, Early Genesee Giant, Giant Square Head and Queen Meg produced the stiffest straw. 6-In the average of four years' experiments in seeding winter wheat on different dates, it is found that when the wheat was sown later than September 9th, the crop was much poorer than when the seeding took place on or before that date. 7-In the average results from growing winter wheat for seven years in succession, it is observed that the white grained varieties have given the largest yields per acre in those seasons when there was but little rust, and the red grained varieties in those seasons in which the rust was

S-The varieties which have given the best average results in the experiments at the College are the varieties which have also given the best satisfaction throughout

San Francisco, Aug. 23.-A special from Missoula, Mont., says westbound freight train No. 53 on the Northern Pacific Railway was wrecked one mile east of Horse Plains on the Rocky Mountain division yesterday and four train hands lost their lives. The dead are: George Weigle, engineer, Hope, Idaho: L. I. Frizelle, fireman, Hope Idaho; J. W. Bolger, brakeman, Spokane; R. M. Fish, wiper, Jocko, Idaho. The train left Missoula Friday night. When opposite Mile Board a huge filling several hundred feet long spread. throwing the entire train into Clark's Fork River. The victims mentioned were all instantly killed. Their bodies have been recovered. It is supposed the slide was caused by settling of quicksand. The roadway is still impassable and the officials are withholding the details of the wreck.

DEATH IN THE STORM.

Many People Killed by Lightning in Indiana-Wallace's Show Tents Wrecked by Wind.

Chicago, Aug. 23.—Despatches from points in Indiana and Ohio report severe storms last night, accompanied by much destruction of property by lightning and some fatallties. Telegraphic communication is very much impaired and full reports are hard to obtain. At Indianapolis the wind reached hurricane velocity, but no serious prop-erty loss was sustained, nor were any lives lost. The rainfall was very heavy. Near Rome City, Ind., a large barn was destroyed by lightning and Arthur Foss, aged 14, was killed. Elwood, Ind., lightning demolished Rev. T. J. Wright's residence. All the family escaped injury but Mr. Wright, who was horribly burned and paralyzed from the waist down.

Greensburg, Ind., reports heavy damage to crops and several bridges were washed away. Mrs. John Baumgardner of Wabash was struck by lightning and fatally injured. Lester Bliss and Nell Bliss at Delphos, O., were killed by lightning. At Hobart, Ind., the dwelling of a man named Smith was demolished by lightning and the entire family of three persons kill

At Huntington, Ind., Wallace's show tents were wrecked by the storm at 6.30 o'clock last evening. The horses and me-nagerie stampeded and much property was ruined. The elephants caused a panic.
