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THE BOARD OF WORKS.

Coun. Mallon Calls for a Committee of Investigation.

SAYS HE CAN PROVE WRONG-DOING.

A lively session of Council last Monday—Very Little Business Done, but no End of Talk—Coun. Burrows Enlightens Reeve Touchburn as to the Meaning of the Term "Boulder"—Communications, Reports Etc.

Some of our city fathers were in a combative mood last Monday, and could they have had their way the session would have lasted till the "wee sma' hours" about the town. The board of works was the disturbing factor, and the council evaded a weary vigil in store by appointing a committee to investigate the actions and expenditures of the regularly constituted body since the 15th January last.

The absence of Deputy Reeve Gillopy, chairman of the board, blocked many inquiries relative to work and outlay. Business was taken up at 7.40, when the minutes were read and confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS.

From L. K. Jones, governor-general's secretary, Ottawa, acknowledging receipt of petitions urging improvements in the Seneca, also at Rosedale and Bobcaygeon.

From Thos. Bick, with reference to an epileptic boy named Frank Kelly, asking that he be sent to some institution; also from Dr. Herriman, on the same subject.

Mayor Smyth explained that the boy had been issued a license, and although the council should not treat her unjustly.

Coun. SOUTHERAN said the committee were honest in thinking the evidence was not sufficiently conclusive, but if other evidence could be furnished they would gladly move to refer the report back.

Coun. MALLON, in his reference to the case, again scored for their persistent neglect of the walks and roads. Some decision would be arrived at regarding Mr. Wilson's claim, so that she might enter suit if dissatisfied.

Coun. BURROWS—Some of the council know she has no legal claim because she was induced to withhold the entry of the suit within the proper time by deceitful promises of a fair settlement; it was a cowardly thing to treat her in that way. (Applause.)

After some further discussion the matter was referred back to the committee for further consideration, the other clauses being adopted.

Coun. SOUTHERAN then read a second report from the joint committee relative to the unanimous acceptance of the roller and issuing of a cheque therefor, Dep. Reeve of Reeve Touchburn, \$100.
