A Dark Tragedy Brought to Light Near Galt.

WAS EVIDENTLY BEATEN TO DEATH.

Ber Body Was Hurrledly Buried in a Corn Field. Where it Was Found by Searchers Yesterday Morning-No Doubt it Was a Foul Murder Two Arrests.

Galt, Ont., Aug. 15.-The mystery of the disappearance of Mrs. Anthony Orr of North Dumfries, alsout three miles from Galt, was cleared up about 11 o'clock this morning by the finding of her body, badly decomposed, in a shallow grave in a corn patch, within 25 yards of the house.

The deceased woman mysteriously aissippeared on Monday morning last, and at the same time a shot gun was missing which she was supposed to have taken with her, with the evident intention of committing suicide, but why she should do so was not known, as her domestic relations were of the best.

discoverer drew the attention of others of the party to the fact. Removing some of the soil with a stick they came on the body of the unfortunate woman. The grave was not two feet deep and looked as if it had been hastily made, and the body even more hastily buried, being only covered with a few inches of

The body presented a fearful sight. The head and shoulders were badly batfered, as if done with some blunt instru-It is evident that the crime is one of

premeditated murder, as everything points that way. The intention of the murderers must have been to bury the body of their victim in the freshly-made grave found dug in the swamp about 300 yards from the house. But a probable disturbance in their work caused a change in their plans. The body was removed to a shed, where a jury empanelled by Coroner Radford,

viewed it and adjourned until Wednesday at 1 o'clock in the council chambers at Galt, when the result of the postmortem will be given. What the motive for the murder could have been is a mystery. Two arrests have already been made, a young man named Allison, who was employed on the farm, and a medical student named Treleaven, who resides in Galt. The former has been interviewed several times and it was evident that he knew more than he cared to tell. The gun was found hidden in the barn, but it had not been used and was evideally taken with the object of throwing suspicion from the guilty parties. Mr. Orr, who, during the past week has been in terrible suspense, was somewhat relieved when the true state of affairs was made known and many kind friends and neighbors are with him to

comfort him in every way possible. Besides the husband there are a daughter and son left. The scene of the tragedy was visited by hundreds from Galt and the surrounding country. This afternoon there was a continual stream of curious people heading in that direction from the time the finding of the body was known natil evening.

New York, Aug. 13 .- Wheat still climbs upward, bringing untold nappiness to the farmer, the retail and wholesale merchants and the speculators as well. The entire country finds in this high price for wheat the cornerstone upon which the expected prosperity is to stand.

The best expert crop statisticians figure out a total wheat crop of about 500,000,000 bushels. At the present prices for cash wheat prevailing in Minneapolis, St. Louis and this city the farmers are receiving about 90 cents a bushel for their product. The wheat already sold of the present crop is about 72,000,000 bushels, which brought \$57,-600,000, at the average rate of 80 cents per bushel. The balance of the crop, even should cash wheat not go higher, will bring \$415,200,000, an increase over last year of \$128,400,000.

Of the crop of 1896 there remained unsold on Jan. 1 of the present year Office and Express Money Orders are about 190,000,000 bushels. This was sold for an average price of 70 cents, an increase of 12 cents over fast year. BLAZE AT THE C. P. Warden Gilmour's Apartments Consider-

ably Damaged-A Fireman Injured.

Toronto, Aug. 12. The warden's apartments at the Central Prison, Strachan-avenue, were seriously damaged by fire early last night, and Foreman Abraham Charlton of Dundas-street Hall was injured seriously while fighting The fire took place in a blind attic over the warden's building, which divides the right and left wings of the prison. Smoke

coming through the roof was observed by Massey-Harris workmen at 5.20, and Mrs. Gilmour, who was in the burning building, also discovered the fire, and an alarm was given from the box at the The western section of the fire brigade responded quickly, but the fire was hard to get at. It was in an attle that has never been used for anything since it was on fire before, about ten years ago. The only entrance to the attic was tarough a small trap door, which could be reached with a step-ladder from the hall near the warden's sleeping apartments. The fire had got into the roof, and the water necessary to put it out flooded the whole of the apartments, and, although the damage by fire is only nominal, the water played havoc with the apartments underneath, and Dr. Gilmour estimates that it will take \$5000 to put things as they were before. When Dr. Gilmour was appointed warden a year ago, the place was thoroughly re-painted and renovated, but the water

has made an awful mess of it, the ground floors appearing like a miniature lake for an hour after the fire. Fireman Charlton received his injuries at about 6 o'clock. He was in the attic, which was filled with smoke. There was no flooring on the place and no windows in it. The vast amount if water that had been poured in had weakened the plaster floor, and when Charlton trod on it be fell right through the rafters into the hall be-He was picked up unconscious and home, 45 Bellevue-avenue. CANADIAN STONE GOES FREE

But No Thanks to the E. S. Government, as They Would Have Had to Pay the Duty Themselves.

Washington, Aug. 13 .- Secretary Gage to-day instructed the Collector of Customs at Buffalo, N. Y., to admit to entry the Canadian stone needed for the work on the Buffalo breakwater, pending a final settlement as to the rate of duty and by whom to be paid. Under this arrangement the work on the improvement will not be delayed. It is said at the Treasury that the usual provision in tariff acts admitting free of duty articles of any character intended for Government use was stricken out, so that the duty on this stone will have to be paid by the War Department from its present appropriation, or Congress may be asked at its next session to remit the duty. Abuse by contractors of the privilege of entering goods free for Government use, it is said, was the cause of the provision being stricken out of the present act.

MURDERER'S BREAK.

Alded by His Brother He made a Desperate Attempt to Escape from the State Prison.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 10.-While attempting to escape from the State prison at Charlestown at noon to-day Herbert Willis, the young Taunton desperado, who was recently sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of Fred N. Strange, was fatally injured, and his brother Edward, who assisted him in his break for liberty, was seriously wounded by the guards. Two of the latter were wounded by the Willis brothers, who tried to shoot their way out with revolvers, which Edward Willis, the murderer's brother, had brought with him on a visit to the prisoner. Edward Willis arrived at the prison this afternoon to pay a monthly visit to his brother. He was admitted by the usual officials and Willis, the murderer, was escorted to the guard room to meet his relative. At the time Officer Edward Whitham and Turnkey Darling were in the ro-

Townsend and others near by. Five other visitors were in the rotunda at the time, a man, two women and two child-The brothers Willis had been conversing in a low tone, sitting apart from the others in the guard room, for about half an hour, when Officer Whithari saw the visitor pass a revolver to his brother, and together they sprang towards the turnkey, their intention evidently being to secure his keys. Whitham rushed to Darling's assistance and as he did so the Willis brothers opened fire. One of the bullets struck Darling in the thigh. Seeing the desperate nature of the af-Whitham returned the shots, but missed, and Officer Abbott, who came through the door into the guard room at the same instant, saw the trouble and grappled wab Edward Willis. Both brothers, who had been beating Darling, legan to pound Abbott. Officer Townsens from the office door then fired a shot, which penetrated the neck of Willis, and a second later Officer Benjamin, who was on duty in one of the

wings, fired a shot through the bars, wounding Walas in the head. Meanwhile Herbert Willis had been jumping around in lively fashion, firing repeated shots, to which the officials responded, using great care not to hit the other visitors. A shot from the rein the head, while one from Darling's found lodgment in the back of the head The murderer was then secured and removed from the scene. Edward Willis was also taken away and the officers, nearly all of whom bore some marks of the effair, were given prompt medical


