Hints For Painting.

It is very seldom that an amateur painter is thoroughly satisfied with a job of painting after it is finished. The best way, of course, is to employ a practical painter, but where this is impossible, and for touches about the house which it would not pay a painter to call and do, a few hints may be given. First see that the surface is thoroughly prepared, that it is dry, clean and free from grease; if there are any rough spots sandpaper them, and then brush ff the dust. On new work shellac the cnots and putty nail holes. Keep the paint well mixed or stirred while the work is being done; lay the paint on evenly and brush it out well, following the direction of the grain of the wood. Never apply a second coat till the first is perfectly dry and hard. Do not overcharge your brush with paint, or replenish before it is exhausted.
