MR. SAM MUNRO, PETERBORO, HOME FROM DAWSON CITY

A Year's Experience in the Mining Country-Observations in General-Gold Hard to Get-Dawson a Moral

Peterboro Daily Review, July 27 1 Mr. Sam. Munro, of the Clarke-Munro-Neill party, which left town on March 31st of last year for the Klondike, arrived home last evening and granted the Review representative a pleasant interview this afternoon. He looks none the worse of his trip to the Klondike. He left the other members of the party camped on the Hunker creek, the mouth of which is about ten miles from Dawson. Their camp is about ten miles up the creek. All are in good health. Mr. Munro left Dawson on June 15th, and came down the river by way of St. Michael's, then by Vancouver and C.P.R. The Garrone, on which he mdae passage from St. Michael's to Vancouver, brought down

Mr. Munro is undecided as whether he will stay or return to Dawson. He is pleased with prospects of the country up there and states that if he were not a married man he would never have come down. The party is still composed as when it left town. Last summer they spent some time on the Stewart river but this did not pry as well as it was expected to. The cost of production was too great. They got to Dawson in July They spent last winter up the creeks. They have a number of claims located and the prospects of these are somewhat uncertain. Mr. Munro states that there is lots of gold in the country, but the cost of getting it out is so great that there is really little profit in it.
