An Assessment Matter.

In deciding the value of property at a court of revision held recently, Judge Ardagh, of Barrie, referred to the difficulty assessors often have in the correct interpretation of the words, 'actual cash value.' Boer Threats of Wrecking if War Is Declared.

THEY WILL BLOW UP THE MINES

Johannesburg Will Be Ruined, and Millions of Dollars Worth of Machinery Will Be Destroyed-This Policy, if

Carried Out, Will Bring Financial Ruin to Thousands in England.

London, Aug. 12 .- The Boer organ in London, The Standard and Diggers' News, publishes a Johannesburg despatch threatening Great Britain, in the event of war, saying the Boers are determined to wreck the mines and irretrievably ruin the general body of shareholders by blowing up millions worth of machinery, adding that war will mean LAST WEEK'S LACROSSE MATCH the absolute ruin of Johannesburg, both as a town and as a mining centre, and saying: "While it will doubtless end in a victory for England, the price of that victory will be the ruin of thousands who ought to consider the price they 'ment to declare war."

Further Concessions Predicted Another Johannesburg despatch, however, predicts further concessions, and says: "The reply of the Transvaal to the proposal for a joint inquiry is being delayed until the Government has prepared a scheme granting the Uitlanders immediate and substantial representation, as the Transvaal will make every effort to avert intervention in the internal affairs of the country."

THREE AMERICANS KILLED.

Gen. Young's Brigade Skirmished and Finally Occupied San Mateo.

Manila, Aug. 14.-A reconnaissance on Saturday by troops of General Samuel B. M. Young's brigade, with the object of discovering the whereabouts of the enemy near San Mateo, northeast of the San Juan reservoir, about ten miles from Manila, resulted in the occupation of San Mateo. The American loss was three killed and 18 wounded, including a lieutenant of the 21st Infantry. The Americans were exhausted by the

heavy marching. Twenty-three of the enemy are known to have been killed This is the first action in which Col. Burt's colored troops participated. They behaved well, their leaders having diffi culty in holding them back. Gen. Young accompanied Captain Parker's column and was under fire throughout the engagement. It is estimated that the enemy numbered between 300 and 400 men.

A RIOT AT DERRY.

Protestants and Nationalists Attacked Police and Stones Flew Lively.

Londonderry, Aug. 14.—The Protesant celebration of the anniversary of the relief of Derry, besieged by James II.'s army in 1689, led to riotous scenes here yesterday. An excursion party, composed of 400 members of a 98 Club arrived from Belfast, but the police refused to allow the excursionists to enter the city. The appearance of a Nationalist band to meet the party caused disorders and stone throwing. Both mobs attacked the police. Finally the Riot Act was read, and the Mayor of Londonderry called out the garrison. Eight constables were seriously


CONTRACT VS. DAY LABOR
