Another medical examiner passed five fine looking beer drinkers, who appeared to be in the best of health and good risks for the insurance society. In a few years doctors observed the same fatality. Thus beer, far from being the harmless stuff advocated, proves to be most deadly. As one doctor says, "I think beer kills quicker than any other kind of liquor." And the eminent professor, the late Dr. C. A. Lee of New York, hesitated not to say that, in his opinion, "malt liquors are more deleterious in their effects on the system than spirits." Moreover, life insurance companies have found that beer drinking forecloses on life 40 to 60 per cent sooner

The only safe calcu ation a young man can make who begins to patronize the saloon, is to count himself dead at the start, and all that he lives beyond that as pure gain.
