feel the benefit. Toronto Live Stock Market. Trade was perhaps a little better at the western cattle market to-day. Receipts were heavy but most of the stuff was well taken. There came in 87 carloads, including 500 sheep and lambs, 290 hogs and 25 calves. Receipts for the week ending Saturday, Aug. 27, were: -Cattle, 3,396; sheep and lambs, 1,720; hogs, 826; weigh fees, \$53.63. A good deal of stuff went through

Cattle-No fat export cattle effered, and there was nothing done in this line. Messrs. Regers & Halligan bought between 25 and 30 carloads of stockers and short keep cattle for Bickerdike & Co. of Montreal, besides two loads of butchers cattle. Stockers fetch from 3 to 31c according to quality. Short keep cattle reached as high as 40 per ib for a few fancy head, but most of the sales were made at 31c. Butchers' cattle brought from from 31 to 31c per m, the latter for pretty good ones. Some sales were: 22 stockers, 1,050 lbs average, \$10 per head; 20 do, 1,250 average, 4c per h; 2) butchers', 1,000 lbs average, 31c lbs. per h; 20 do, 1,025 hs, 32x; 20 cows, 1,100, \$35 per head; 10 stockers, 1,050, 32c; 10 choice butchers,
