In Madras and Calcutta, India, the writer has seen a large mortality from cholers among the poorer classes where unsanitary conditions prevalled, while immediately around them Europeans and natives who observed ordinary precautions in food and drink were wholly free from the disease. Boiling kills the germs of cholers, and perhaps it is well during a cholera epidemic to use boiled water and boiled milk.
