In addition to a locally disappointing grain crop as to quantity and quality the farmers of the district have to bear the serious disadvantage of unusally low prices. The prices of our two leading staples of farm produce are away down, and many believe they have not yet touched hard pan. There is little or no encouragement in the situation to warrant us in advising any one to hold or wait for higher prices. Wheat in Lindsay is quoted today at 63c. to 65c.; the price in Chicago
for October wheat is 72c. to 73½c. with
a feeling that 75c. is about low enough, and that is the bid for December wheat. In Toronto the price is 67c. for spring. The opportunity seems to be a good one \$1,400,000 for the N.
