The Lindsay central exhibition, which opens in this town next Tuesday, promises from present indications to be the most successful of the series. The occasion will be graced by the presence of the lieutenant-governor of Ontario and Mrs. Kirkpatrick, and the interest of the day's proceedings will be greatly enhanced. We are informed entries in number up to this date considerably surpass those of previous years. All concerned should do their best to increase the success of the exhibition. The event is of great value and interest to farmers and stock-raisers of the district, and the show as a district affair should be made every year more successful. That will, we are confident, be the result this year, and consequently the attendance, if the weather is fine, will be very large. The president, directors, and secretary, have been indefatigable in their labors, and they will, it is expected, have the gratification of seeing the show a grand success. Much will depend on the weather, of course, but there is a general impression that the worthy secretary Mr. Keith, has fixed Old Probs in the right way, so that there will be nothing wanting in that respect. There is also to be a brilliant display of fireworks by the celebrated Hand of Hamilton. The program for the exhibition will be found in detail in our advertising columns, 7th page.

LOW PRICES FOR FARM PRODUCE.

In addition to a locally disappointing grain crop as to quantity and quality the farmers of the district have to bear the serious disadvantage of unusually low prices. The prices of our two leading staples of farm produce are away down, and many believe they have not yet touched hard pan. There is little or no encouragement in the situation to warrant us in advising any one to hold or wait for higher prices. Wheat in Lindsay is quoted today at 63c. to 65c.; the price in Chicago for October wheat is 72c. to 73 1/2c. with a feeling that 75c. is about low enough, and that is the bid for December wheat. In Toronto the price is 67c. for spring. Barley at Lindsay commands only 35c. The opportunity seems to be a good one for the N. P. to get in some work now in putting up prices of what the farmer has to sell. The high priests of that divinity should offer up sacrifices and perform incantations to stir up the sleeping god to a sense of his duty. If it were the sugar barons or cotton lords or coal oil men who were concerned we should see the N. P. at work promptly fixing the tariff to suit the emergency. When the sugar duty was reduced in consequence of the action of the U. S. congress in that direction our tariff was adroitly arranged so that a handsome—a very handsome revenue—still pours into the pockets of the sugar refiners. Many farmers who previously had an abiding faith in the N. P. will no doubt now think over these things, and they can hardly avoid the conclusion that it is a snare and a delusion as far as they are concerned.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The reception tendered Mr. Blake by the Toronto Irish societies last Monday evening was a grand success. Mr. Blake made an eloquent speech explaining reasons that had led him to go into the imperial parliament. Effective speeches were also made by Hon. A. S. Hardy, Rev. Dr. Dewart, Archbishop Walsh, Hon. Peter Mitchell, Dr. Bergin and Hon. John Costigan. It was a non-political gathering. Hon. Frank Smith presided.

The London Advertiser remarks: "Farmers will be interested to know that while eggs were selling in New York at from 19 cents to 23 cents on Wednesday, the price in the market here was from 12 cents to 15 cents per dozen. Restricted trade is an evil, and that continually, to the Canadian farmer." Still, the Canadian farmer voted heavily for restricted trade and has himself to blame if he suffers for it. He seems to like paying tribute to the monopolists.

The tory Hamilton Herald is opposed to Sir John Thompson's leadership. It says: "Does anyone imagine that the people of Canada would endorse either Thompson or Tupper at the next general election? The fact is Sir John Thompson has his chance and made ducks and drakes of it, while the public puts as much confidence in the integrity of Tupper as it does in the stability of a pattern in a kaleidoscope." Still, if it is neither Tupper nor Thompson, who is it to be? Here is where the immaculate John Haggart comes in!

Mr. Cleveland and the democrats are encouraged by the large falling off in the republican vote in Maine and Vermont in the recent state elections. In both states the republicans made the principal issue McKinleyism and Protection, and the democrats found it advisable to drop some state questions and go in strong for tariff reform and free trade. McKinley himself stumped Vermont, and the urgent importance of rolling up big republican majorities in order to affect the national contest was presented from every republican platform. Still there was such a marked falling off that if it obtains to the same extent in other states Cleveland will sweep the country. In Arkansas, on the other hand, the democratic majority was largely increased, despite the apprehension that the silver or alliance movements might make large inroads in the regular vote.
