LINDSAY'S BIG FAIR A GRAND SUCCESS.

A Royal Welcome Given Lieut.-

Gratifying successes have been achieved in the past by the officers of the South Victoria agricultural society, sometimes under adverse conditions, but that of 1892, the tensh held under the auspices of the society, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week, must be awarded the palm. department of the big fair made its success

a certainty from the first. Tuesday, the first day, was mainly devoted to the placing of exhibits and judging. Inside the hall the scene was one of bustling activity, upon which the public was not allowed to intrude till evening, when all the exhibits were properly placed. Outside the green sward was being covered with agricultural implements and other articles intended for the use of the farmer, and the officers of the society were here, there and everywhere, lending aid as requilred.
