A suicide by dynamite is reported from Canada in the department of the Ayrton, Ontario. The perpetrator of the act of violence was a man named Albon.

On Friday evening the St. John N. B. Express collided with a drunken Indian. The train was walking along the track, and as the train approached a heavy lurch pushed him on the sleepers.

During a storm last Sunday night a special train in charge of Engineer White and Conductor McIntosh left Truro N. S., for Stellarton.

Because he fancied he was about to be defrauded out of \$10 which he had loaned George Stiles some time ago, Robert Radway at Philadelphia planned a terrible revenge, which Monday morning he put into effect on the street.

Six young men of Gananoque, named Wellington Davis, Joseph Davis and Ben Davis, brothers; and Nathaniel Peore, Charles Chadwick and John Haig of Gananoque, were walking in a skiff on the St. Lawrence on Saturday morning.

The Chicago limited express train from Boston broke through a trestle bridge on the Boston and Albany railroad a mile and a half east of Chester about 12.30 on Thursday last, and four Wagner cars, fatally crushed, killing at least 13 persons.

19 of them have been identified. It is believed that there are two more in the ruins. A disastrous street car accident took place in Cincinnati O., Sunday evening at 7.30 o'clock.

A young child of Mrs. A. J. Nia, 328 Victoria avenue north, Hamilton, while playing with a kite on Saturday evening, set fire to it. The flames spread to the child's clothing, and before they could be extinguished by the mother and a neighbor the child was badly burned on the right side.

A sad accident happened to M. C. B-section foreman Neil McPhee's little 10-year-old boy, named Angus, at Niagara Falls on Saturday. He picked up a bulldog repeater revolver in St. Clair-avenue, not knowing what it was, being a very short barrel to the weapon.

At midnight Saturday, Byron M. Brown, an old and well-known resident of Lanesh, Mich., shot and killed Montgomery Henderson in a quarrel over a poker game. The only witnesses were Fred Carr and a young man named Hernie, both of whom have been detained.
