AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.
DESCRIPTIVE LETTER BY A
LINDSAY VISITOR.

Inside the Building—Canada's Poor Ex-
hibit—Magnificent Displays of Other
Nations.
The attractions outside the building are
so great that one does not care to go in,
but with a lingering look at the soft
green sward, the cool sparkling water,
and the marvellous, ever varying beauties
of these snow-white palaces, we will leave
them for a little and enter the Manufactur-
ers' and Liberal Arts Building. Like every-
thing else at the fair, it is colossal, covering
as it does some 31 acres, or, as the
galleries about 44 acres. It is, I am told,
the largest building that has ever been
erected, and it seems to have been no
difficulty in the doing of it, for the giant
rafters, in addition to supporting the
roof, have also long been supporting
thousands of human beings, who, coming
to the roof by elevators, have been using it
for a promenade and observatory. This,
however, has been stopped since the cold
storage fire, the directors fearing another
catastrophe.

THE FRENCH EXHIBIT.
France, perhaps, the most attractive
court. In her pavilion are some 30 rooms,
and each one is full of elegant and costly
things. The tapestries are usually the
centre of admiring crowds, and really at
the distance from which you view them it
is hard to imagine that they are woven
and not painted. Then there is the Sevres
china, Worth's dresses and cloaks, bronzes,
statuary, clocks, handsome furniture cov-
ered with gold delicately carved, old
Louis XIV. chairs, sofas, etc.; one parlor
is filled with fine tapestries, and the
marking of a small fountain of perfume
free to the handkerchief public; cases of
marvellous baby clothes, wondrous in lace
and embroidery, and a large hall where
severe trials to any poor baby whose parents
were foolish enough to buy them; and
large stores of every conceivable shape, size,
and color of hats, and a large hall where
clothes, dresses, pieces half done and
pieces wholly finished; in certain dress-
ing rooms, gowns, brags, veils, and other
things too numerous to mention.
