AT THE WORLD'S FAIR DESCRIPTIVE (LETTER BY LINDSAY VISITOR.

RAMBLES THROUGH THE MINES AND MINING, HORTICULTURAL AND CHILD-REN'S BUILDINGS - THE BEAUTIES OF

Separated from the Manufacturers bailding by the North Canal is the electrical building, con sining some of the most lateresting exhibits at the fair. It is a large building covering about 51 acres, and is handsomely decorated without. The exhibits in this building are chiefly interesting to scientists interested in electricity. To the casual sight-seer eventhe very centre is a huge column rising marvellous buildings shining through the slimost to the roof, thickly studded with incandescent lights which appear and disappear at regular intervals. In the south-east corner of the building is a pretty little electric scene theatre which is so unassuming in its outside appearance that one might easily miss it, and is yet so interesting and pretty that one would be very sorry to do so. Once inside you find yourself in a small room seating perhaps fifty. It is perfectly dark, and when the curtain rises there is before you an Alpine scene. Mountains rise to considerable height on either hand, and at their feet neetles a small Alpine village consisting of a few houses and a church past which runs, trickling over stones and making a pretty rippling noise, a stream of real water. It is evening and lighte shine from the windows of all the houses. In a moment they are extinguished and absolute darkness prevails, until the moon, rising, sheds gradually over the scene her soft, dreamy light. This as gradually disappears, and is followed by a period of darkness which is only dispelled when morning breaks, grey and hazy. Very slowly and calmly the morning dawns then brighter and brighter, until it bursts into the brilliant transparency of noonday, but presently clouds begin to gather and darken the landscape, and vivid flashes of peal after peal of thunder. When the storm is over the sun again lights up the scene, which gradually passes through all

lightning dart across the sky followed l the shades and tints of a summer sunset and then through the grey tints of fading daylight, until darkness falls again upon the scene, the lights again appear in the houses, and the play is over. The first thing one sees on entering is a huge monolith of coal reaching almost to the roof, and on all four sides of it is painted in gold letters"Pennsylvania Coal." There is not the slightest danger that any one will forget that Pennsylvania is noted for its coal. Almost the first thing everyone asks for is the silver statute of Ada Reban as "Justice." It is in the pavilion of Montana. It is solid silver and is worth \$75,000, and the golden pedestal upon which it stands, 8224,000. I presume the value put upon this statute was based upon the value given to silver by the silver of Cape Colony diamonds, showing their worth, treatment from the time they are dug from the earth until they lie out and polished ready for use. The huge machines are at work washing the dirt from the stones and a row or men are at work behind glass windows cutting and polishing. This is one of the few places at the fair which is always crowded, and a guard is always close at hand to keep the crowd constantly moving. If I were a sufficiently clever writer to make piles of stones and coal, heaps of rock which looked to my unappreciative eyes as if it might be picked up on any roadside, blocks of granite and pieces of limestone, interesting, this page of THE POST would scarcely hold a description of the Mices and Mining building; but unfortunately I'm not, so I won't attempt it.
