GLADSTONE WILL FIGHT THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

Preparing for a Life and Death Struggle with the Peers-His Programme for the Coming Session of Parliament. LONDON, Sept. 19. - The Marquis of Salisbury's great rally of peers against the home rule bill has accomplished what the unionists least intended, Instead of discouraging Mr. Gladstone the action of thrown down by the upper house and he had decided to dissolve parliament after passing two or three measures from the Newcastle programme. Ever since he went on his holidays to Blackcraig castle he has been studying the situation and consulting by letter with his lieuten-A regular meeting of the town aldermen ants. On Thursday the liberals thought the house and declare his policy. This led him to decide in favor of making his statement to his constituents.

WELSH DISESTABLISHMENT.

This statement will be the programme of the government until the next general election. Definite information as to the items was spread among the liberal and radical members yesterday. The most important measures to which Mr. Gladstone will commit himself in his Elinburgh address will be the parish councils bills, Wales and Scotland, the electoral registration reform, and "one man one vote bills, and proposals for battering the relations of landlords and tenants in London. The Welsh say that Mr. Gladstone has promised to make their disestablishment bill the principal measure of the autumn session. All the measures indicated in the above list will be pushed forward with all possible dispatch in the house of commons, and until they be disposed of there will be no appeal to the country if the cabinet can prevent it. Such a mass of legislation can hardly be finished before 1896. The home rule bill will be re-introduced in the house of lords.

EMBROILING THE PEERS. It is not expected that Mr. Gladstone will state at Edinburgh the ultimate object of his programme. He will not proclaim the immediate necessity of altering the constitution and bettering or abolishing the house of lords. He will merely indicate a new polloy whose object it is to embre!! the pears so nopelessly in a quarrel with the people that are electors will give nim a sweeping British majority two years hence. With such a majority at his command he could deal with the upper house as he might please. The whole plan is regarded as astute and bold, but weak at several points. Its success would depend on the constant support of all the Irish members. The liberal federation has meanwhile declared for abolition of the

hereditary chamber. Mr. Gladstone will pass the parliament ary recess at Hawarden. The Irish estimates were voted this week with unprecadented celerity. The unionists tried to start a pretracted debate, but the Irish members held their peace determinedly. Not before in the last twelve years have the nationalists declined the challenges given regularly by the conservatives during this part of the debate on supply. Thier new self-restraint is regarded as the best evidence of their satisfaction with John Morley's regime, as well as of their
