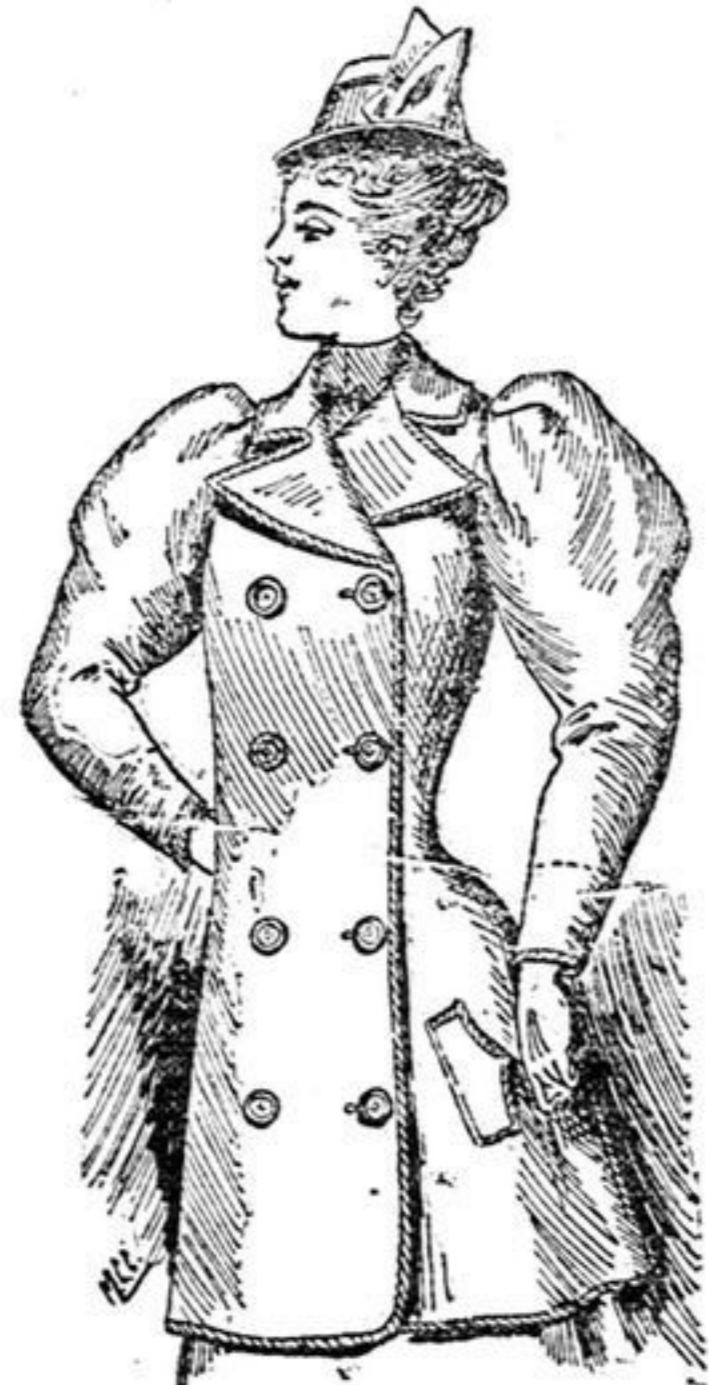

That True Blue Excursion. (To the Editor of The Post.)

Sir:—At a meeting of the general committee having charge of the Royal True Blue excursion to Lindsay on civil holiday, certain statements published in the Lindsay press were brought to the notice of the excursionists who accompanied the True Blues to Lindsay on that day, and as the statements referred to reflect upon the personality of the Royal True Blues of Toronto in anything but a creditable manner the committee deem an explanation necessary—doubtless on account of the liberal manner in which the press has dealt out denunciations; and as the public has not heard from those in charge of the excursion we ask what we believe the Lindsay press will accord to us, and that is, British fair play. Through what has appeared in the press has done us wrong, and after a fair hearing we would ask the public to draw their conclusions.

We are sorry that the Lindsay press does not understand the personnel of our members, or the nature of our organization, else it would have sympathized with us in this unfortunate occurrence, which has proved so humiliating, not only to the one thousand True Blues of Toronto, but to our tens of thousands of members and sympathizers in the Dominion. The committee having charge of the excursion consisted of 46 members of the union, one in each city, and therefore represented in the neighborhood of one thousand members. Our first committee meeting was flooded with communications from independent life and drum bands, offering their services free to the committee for our civil holiday excursion. Only one band, the "Prince Arthur," was accepted, the members of which carried themselves in a gentlemanly manner. The Ulster band accompanied the Orange battalion, which was duly invited. This band and those they men did credit to themselves and those they accompanied, but this cannot be said of the "Derry Band," or the "Young Central," who came on their own invitation. The trains had no sooner moved out of the station than the committee was apprised of the fact that except their actions in Lindsay would disgrace our society and the good name of our organization would be at stake, consequently the committee was hurriedly brought together and decided to give the band returned to tickets at half-rate, to return for which the band members guaranteed their good behavior, to

abstain from liquor and to be peaceful and law-abiding; yet, to our dismay and in face of what we did, some of them (not all of them) acted in a disgraceful manner, causing, we are informed, the scrimmage which has been so magnified and set forth by the Lindsay press as being perpetrated by loyal True Blues.

We have no hands connected with the True Blue society in Toronto, nor does the membership of such belong to our order, nor have we any control over or connection therewith, nor can we be held responsible for their actions, or any one accompanying us to Lindsay. But we can speak for every member belonging to the Loyal True Blue Association and say without fear of contradiction that all did credit to themselves, to the city from whence we came, and the order to which we belong. We have no battle axe corps, nor have we any record of our name being connected with any excursion to the city of Hamilton, as referred to in a Lindsay paper.

Besides, such an excursion never took place under True Blue auspices, and we trust that the under-true-blue spirit is not to be trusted, as a story trifling with the good name of an organization, and the very teaching of which is founded upon the holy bible, and having in its ranks such men and women as are connected therewith in Toronto, among whom are named the following: A bishop of the Church of England, clergymen, ministers, members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, doctors, merchants, Sunday school superintendents, teachers, classical and scientific men, and many others, all of whom are members of the W. C. T. U., leaders in all our social organizations in which women are engaged. Why the churches and schoolrooms are at our service at any time, and many a man and woman and child are held therein.

We value our name and our society, and we feel that the statements made in the Lindsay press, and that such would have appeared had our excursion taken place, would be a very grave mistake in allowing those bands and societies who were not members of their order to walk in their procession, thereby representing that they were members of their order, and also when the rowdyism occurred, assisting the constabulary in maintaining order. If they were not reprimanded in the procession, why disown them when they disgraced themselves? If the Orange True Blues had assisted in quelling the disorder and helped the constabulary to arrest the guilty ones, they would have had the respect of every good citizen of Lindsay, whereas they now have their disapprobation. The action of the Orange lodge in this town in condemning the editor of The Post for censuring the rowdyism of the memorable Monday was very unfair, in place of so doing they should have upheld us and given us their support and approval in discountenancing such rowdyism. However, it is certainly placing a premium on such conduct, which the society can very ill afford to do, as it is a fact beyond dispute that order among Orangemen on such occasions is not good at the best. We have the satisfaction of knowing we have the support of every independent citizen of both sides of politics in the stand we took, and they have our positive assurance that rowdyism by any person or persons, no matter their politics or religion, will always receive the disapproval of The Post.
