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THE CASE DISMISSED.

The Charge of Fraud Against E. J. O'Sullivan Quashed. Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock Police Magistrate McIntyre resumed the preliminary hearing in the case of fraud against Mr. E. J. O'Sullivan. Mr. Steers, the counsel for the defence, asked that Mr. Bowlin be recalled for further cross-examination, and after being sworn, Mr. Steers produced a letter dated at Woodville, May 11th, 1895, and asked witness if he recognized it, and he said "yes." The letter was read to the court. In it Mr. Bowlin asked Mr. O'Sullivan for the some money, (but it is not of salary), and stated that he needed it. He ended his letter by asking Mr. O'Sullivan to overlook the past—and if he did not, he would never be able to talk on the subject with Mr. O'Sullivan. The next witness was Walter Curtis, a brother of the last witness, and he stated that the articles of agreement were at that time there had been some talk of his taking a second term; also that his sister had expressed a desire to attend but no promise had been made. This closed the case for the prosecution, and Mr. O'Sullivan entered the box in his own defence. Being sworn, he said that he and Mr. Bowlin had a business deal in July, 1894; he had told Bowlin that there was a contract for the college, and that some of them were as good as promises. A few days subsequent to the signing of the agreement they had figured on the number of pupils likely to attend the college as a result of the advertisements in The Post, Watchman and Warrier, and also papers in other towns near here. On being cross-examined by Mr. Anderson, he said that the reason the pupils did not "pan out" was because they did not care to take an interest in the Lindsay school. He said that Mr. Bowlin was also to have a half-interest in the school at Sherbrooke, Que.; and that the articles of agreement were at present in the hands of his solicitor in Sherbrooke, awaiting the signature of Bowlin. They should both have been there when the case was dismissed. Mr. Steers then addressed the magistrate at some length, as also did Mr. Anderson, and the case was dismissed. FALL FAIRS.
