She stated that she had never promised to attend the business college conducted by Mr. O'Sullivan-at home there had been some talk of her doing so, but she had never had a talk on the subject with Mr. O'Sallivan.

The next witness was Walter Curtis, a

brother of the last witness, and he stated

that he had attended the college and that

there had been some talk of his taking a

second term; also that his sister had expressed a desire to attend but no promises had been made. This closed the case for the prosecution, and Mr. O'Sullivan entered the box in his own defence. Being sworn, he said that he and Mr. Bowins had a business deal in July, 1894; he had told Bowins that there had been a great many talking to him about attending the college, and that some of them were as good as promises. A few days subsequent to the signing of the agreement they had figured on the number of pupils likely to attend the college as a result of the advertisements in THE POST, Watchman and Warder, and also papers in other towns near here. On being cross--Miss May Irvine, of Janetville, who examined by Mr. Anderson, he said that was because they did not care to be taught by Mr. Bowins, he having been a pupil with them. At first Mr. Bowins was to have a half-interest in the school at Barrie, and then he decided to take an interest in the Lindsay school instead. He said that Mr. Bowins was also to have a half-interest in the school at Sherbrooke, Que.; and that the articles of agreement were at present in the hands of his solicitor in Sherbrooke, awaiting the signature of Bowins.
