It is ideal threshing weather and

reports that have come from all over the province show that the weather is very favorable everywhere. Special crop reports from along the Manitoba Northwestern to-day are: Yorkton-Frost on several nights this last fortnight has damaged wheat seriously, but will not affect the district, as 80 per cent. of the crop is oats, which will be a fine crop. Cutting is general, and the weather is favorable. The root crop is very large, potatoes being particularly good. Saltcoats-Harvesting is general, the crop being cut fast. All grain is looking fine; very little is touched by frost immediately around town. Root crops Langenburg-Crop nearly all ripe and harvesting is in full swing. Wheat

has been touched by frost in some Binscarth-Wheat cutting almost finished. Frost of 30th has slightly damaged some of the late wheat. About one-fifth of the oats are cut.
