Canadian Dairymen Charged With Gross Fraud.

BY A BRITISH FARM JOURNAL.

Charged With Selling "Imitation" Cheese in the British Market-Prof. Robertson's Denial-Making Such Cheese in Canada is Prohibited Ender Reavy Penalty.

Montreal, Sept. 10.-A Star special cable from London says: Another scare has been raised in the hope of checking Canadia competition with the British farmer. The North British Agriculturist alleges on what it terms good authority that a considerable proportion of the socalled full milk cheese from Canada is really made from separated milk, fattened with oleomargerine, which is very difficult to detect. It urges that the Board of Agriculture make an expert inquiry and suggests that this explains why the Canadians are able to undersell the British farmers. They sell their cheese at forty shilings per hundredweight, or fourgence per

pound. The Times repeats the charge to-day with deep regret, and says it is nothing short of suicide to the Canadian I have been interviewed by leading

Prot Bobertson's Emphatic Benial Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 10 .- Prof. Robertson, Dairy Comissioner, is out with emphatic denial of the statement made by The London Agriculturist that

Canadian cheese, now being sold in English markets, is made of skimmed milk fattened with oleomargarine. Prof. Robertson says not a single box of this class of cheese is made in Canada, that under the Dairy Products Act of 1893 the manufacture of imitation cheese is prohibited under a heavy penalty, and moreover under an Act passed at the instance of George Taylor, M.P., the importation of oleomargarine into Canada is absolutely pro-

hibited. Prof. Robertson says that filled or imitation chees from the United States may have reached England, but it could not be confounded with Canadian, as all American cheese passing through the Dominion for export is branded at Montreal as "Product of United States."

The Montreal Gang Operated Throughout Canada.

MILLIONS MADE WITH THE TORCH

Chiefs of the Gang Posed as Wholesalers and Terrorized Customers Until They Yielded to Their Propositions -Those Arrested Will 60 to the Grand Jury at Once.

Montreal, Sept. 9.—The eight merchants arrested on charges of arson were brought up in the Police Court this morning, but were not asked to plead. The Attorney-General gave orders that they be brought at once behere the grand jury and this will be

uone to-morrow. John Beiser, the leader of the band, for ten years has defied detection while planning arson conspiracies which will stand out conspicuously in annals of crime. Beiser and his confederates had nothing whatever to do with the Boyd, Gillies & Co. fire, but the repentant incendiary in that case not only confessed to his individual erime, but gave the Crown its arst clue to the great arebug syndl-

Evidence already in possession the Crown identifies the Beiser band with fifteen fires in Montreal alone within the last three Years. These reperesent, it is confidently believed, only a small part of the crimes committed by the band in other Canadian cities westward from Quebec as far as Winnipeg.

The total loss to English and Canadian fire insurance companies mounts up into the millions, representing heavy losses for half a dozen leading companies, whose private detectives for years have been working unsuccessfully, to well-nigh fatal drain upon their surplus funds. Mysterious fires began to attract

general attention in 1885, and so abnormally heavy grew the insurance losses that the rates were advanced year after year until in this city. where the buildings are well made and where the fire department is well disciplined and well equipped, rates on certain risks were \$1.17 on \$100. The merchants of Montreal protested. It was universally recognized that these mysterious fires were a part of the operations of an organized gang. Nine out of every ten fires of mysterious origin were discovered at some time between Saturday night and Monday morning, when the premises devoted to business were presumably va-cant. Investigation of the Boyd, Gillies & Co. fire threw the first light on the mystery. C. D. Hanson, chief adjuster of the Dominion Adjustment Bureau, took the initiative in the work of running down the conspiracy, and employed Silas H. Carpenter of the Canadian Secret Service Company as chief detective. M. J. F. Quinn, Q.C., was employed, and together the three men began operations two months ago. Little by little they accumulated the evidence against Beiser and his fellow conspirators.

The method of the gang may be described briefly as follows: Beiser, Thomas and Davis were wholesalers in various lines, and would sell small merchants on liberal terms as to time. When under pressure of unsuccessful business a creditor would default in payment, the wholesaler would urge him to accept more stock and increase

his insurance. This was done in all of the 15 cases already discovered. The insurance amounted frequently to double the value of the goods. The Beiser gang, selecting their victim with great care, and making sure of his moral pliability, would secretly advise him to burn his store. If this advice was not accepted the crime was insisted upon under penalty of suit for indebted-With ruin staring him in the face, the unfortunate victim would consent to the arrangement, and on the Saturday night set for the fire would turn his store over to Beiser and his followers. The conspirators would then secretly remove the greater part of the stock and arrange the mechanism destined to create the fire.

Victims of the conspiracy who have filed their confessions with the Queen's counsel say that Beiser was originally identified with a small but desperate band of firebugs who operated successfully for a year in New York city, and that when forced to flee to avoid arrest purchased the secret of the alarm clock method from his chief for \$500. Adjuster Hanson and Counsellor Quinn quietly visited New York city in August and devoted an entire week to the task of accumulating evidence against the Beiser syndicate. Some of the unfortunate retailers lured into crime by these conspirators had left Montreal in terror and settled in New York. Restrictions Trade Canada's Progress.

Reduced Duties on British Goods Would Cause a Bigger Demand For Canadian Produce There-The Tory Policy is to Shut Us From

That Market.
