Grants an Interview to New York Newspaper Men, But is Wary and Diplomatic in His Utterances.

New York, Sept. 2.-The Right Ho Joseph Chamberlain, the British Co onial Secretary, arrived in this c y the morning on the steamship T toniwhich left Liverpool on - 1g. 1 When asked whether his visit had any political significance Mr. Chamberlain screwed his gold-rimmed monocle further into his eye, smiled all over his face and said: "Now, really you must excuse me. You see I am simply over on a vacation. I expect to stay in New York but a few hours, intending to go on to my wife's home near Boston as soon as possible, Once there I hope to take a good rest and enjoy my outing. No, I hardly expect to see Mr. Oney during my stay in the United States, I have made no engagements with him, and do not even know in what part of the coun-

try he is spending the summer. "You may be sure, though, that the Venezuelan quest.on will cause no more trouble between England and the United States. The question will be settled in a manner satisfactory to both countries. The Venezuela matter is not in my department," continued Mr. Chamberlain, "though of course I am interested, as British Guiana is a British colony. The impression among the American people that I and not Lord Salisbury is managing the negotiations with the United States is pure invention. Lord Salisbury is in charge. It rests entirely with him. I trust the Venezuelan matter will be amicably adjusted. Of course the action of the commission formed by the United States Government is not and cannot be binding. As Mr. Cleveland himself says, the findings of the American commission are not binding; but we should lock for their report with as much interest as you in the States and hope that it will show such a bright light on the whole matter of dispute that the affair can be readily and easily djusted to the satisfaction of both

Commenting on the cable news, he said: "I see the Germans have recognized a protectorate in Zanzibar and that thy are protecting the uprising Sultan. Well, I do not think we care much for him.

THE IRISH CONVENTION.

Foreign Delegates Issue a Joint Declaraing Was a Success.

Dublin, Sept. 4 .- The foreign delegates to the Irish Race Convention, which concluded its three days' session yesterday, have issued, a joint declaration, in which they say: "We deem it our duty to record our grateful appreciation of the courtesy and kindness with which we have been treated here. We came here without any blas toward any section and with a determination to form an independent opinion based upon our own observations. The delegates who were responsible for the arrangements for holding the convention scrupulously abstained from any attempts to influence our organization, and asked nobody connected with the home movement to attend our conference. We are satisfied that the convention in its composition and its charac-ter voiced the Irish national spirit. We watched the proceedings of the convention throughout, and heard therein the fullest and freest possible discussion, and we were especially impressed with the unanimity that was displayed for genuine party unity. necessarily involving discipline and respect for the rule of the majority. We record our own entire belief in unity, based upon the only foundation possible-submission to the majority-and we earnestly call upon the people to stand together for the cause of unity and discipline in the Irish party in Parilament. As citizens of countries enjoying free government, we affirm that no other effective line is known than submission to the rule of the majority in political organizations. "Upon returning to our home we shall convey to our people a sense of the magnitude, authority and order of the conven-tion, and we piedge ourselves to give our unfailing support to the Irish Parliament-ery party until self-government has been won for Ireland."


