THE NEW MINISTERS INTRODUCED TO THE HOUSE. THEY GOT A ROUSING RECEPTION. Questions Asked and Answered in the House—The Abuse of Power by the Late Government—Intercolumnial Railway Turned Into an Election Machine.

Ottawa, Sept. 2.—The opening proceedings of the House this afternoon included the introduction of the Minister of Railways and Canals (Mr. Blair) and the Controller of Customs (Mr. Paterson).

QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS. Questions by members were the first order. To Mr. Maclean, Mr. Fisher (Minister of Agriculture) said the Government was considering the establishment of a bureau of mining information in Toronto.

Mr. Blair asked about the ballot-boxes in North Ontario, and Major McGillivray having been given the floor on the re-count before Judge Burnham. He wanted to know what the Government intended to do about it.

Mr. Laurier replied that when the legal proceedings in connection with the protest which had been entered against the election had been disposed of, the Government would consider the matter, both as to the seat and the punishment of the offenders.

ABUSE OF POWER. A most flagrant abuse of power on the part of the Government was disclosed to the House by Mr. Donville, the gentleman who compelled Mr. Foster to retire from King's and seek election in York.

Mr. Fraser told the House that in Picton, the constituency represented by Sir Hibber, Pupper and Mr. Bell, books of railway passes were in the hands of boys for distribution to anybody and everybody.

Mr. Gibson, upon the authority of some well-known business men, said that orders were given to the intercolumnial officials to move no freight trains on election day.

Mr. Haggart, the ex-Minister of Railways, protested that no orders had been given or had gone out from headquarters to produce the result.

Mr. McMillen expressed the hope, which was echoed by Ministers and members, that an investigation would be held, so that the men who have assumed the responsibility of these proceedings would have punishment meted out to them.

Mr. Ellis, who redeemed the city of St. John, added to the evidence against the Government in the use of the I.C.R. to unfairly advance its own ends.

Mr. Choquette gave the House still another instance of a joint meeting arranged to be held in Comisouata.

Mr. Davin presented, not for the first time, a motion admitting the expediency of devoting \$20,000 to aid in the establishment of creameries and cheese factories in the Northwest Territories.

New York, Sept. 2.—The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, the British Colonial Secretary, arrived in this city this morning on the steamship T. toni which left Liverpool on Sept. 1.

When asked whether his visit had any political significance Mr. Chamberlain screwed his gold-rimmed monocle furthest into his eye, smiled all over his face and said: "Now, really you must excuse me. You see, I am simply over on a vacation."

Commenting on the cable news, he said: "I see the German papers have raised a protest in Zanzibar and that they are protesting the uprising Sultan. Well, I do not think we care much for that."

ENGLAND'S TAX ON SPORTS. A Large Revenue is Derived from Sporting Licenses in the Old Land. New York, Sept. 2.—A London correspondent says: "A Parliamentary return shows how valuable to the nation is the universal devotion to sport in England: Licenses for guns are taken out by an average of 150,000 persons a year, amounting to \$25,000, half a sovereign being the charge for a license. There are also other taxes covering sporting dogs, etc., and there are the taxes paid by gunners and the like. The fact is that the game laws are so absorbed by the Liberal party."

"HOW OLD ARE YOU?" Is Generally Li Hung Chang's First Greeting.

And sees a Great Many Things to Ask Questions About—The Oriental Ballet, the Performing Elephants and Horse Races Pleased Him Greatly.

Toronto, Sept. 2.—Yesterday was Citizens' Day at the big Fair here, and the attendance was the largest, without exception, of any day since the Exhibition was started. The day was marked by the presence of Li Hung Chang, the distinguished Chinaman, about whom all the continent is talking just now.

Li Hung Chang's impressions of Canada were secured by an interviewer, and will be read with interest. A few minutes after three the party reached the Exhibition grounds station, being met by Mayor Fleming, Col. Dunison, President Withrow and Manager J. H. Dillon.

President Withrow formally welcomed the Chinese visitor, and he was glad to be able to visit the Fair and get an idea of the resources of Canada.

Li Hung Chang then took a seat in his chair, and, borne by four star-wart policemen, entered the grounds and was forthwith almost lost in a throng of thousands upon thousands of adjusted to the satisfaction of both sides.

As soon as the attention could be brought back to the business in hand, the Lieutenant-Governor was welcomed by the Mayor and the Vice-regent and regretted that his visit was so short.

Next came a march past of horses, and a very noisy band of the national band. Here, in full view of 50,000 people, Li Hung Chang enjoyed one of his species of "snuff" smokes.
