Many people believe that temperance is m deration, and this we cannot forget. When the Liberal convention met here in 1893, having to deal, as we thought we had to deal, with the interests of our common country, we thought to have the opinion of the people properly tested, so as to ascertain what the feeling of the country was, whether it should mean absolute abstinence, as you think, or moderation, as some others think. We thought the taking of a plebiscite the best way, and we decided to divest it of every other question which might more or less buy up the judgment of the people. We thought it better to go even further than Sir Oliver Mowat's Government went when it took a plebiscite in connection with municipal elections. We wished the question divested of every other consideration, so that we might have the judgment of the people on this question itself. There are other

The people of Canada are not a unit on the question of abstinence or moderation, and there are also local interests. Take the Province of Quebec, which has had a prohibitory law, which dates from the year 1864. Previous to Confederation, municipal councils were empowered and are still empowered to enact prontbacty bylaws within the municipalities. There is no need to appeal to the people, but the council has the right to enact a prohibitory law, and in some sections of the province this power

has been largely exercised. In the Counties of Lotbiniere, Drummond, Arthabaska, Portneuf and Megantic the sale of liquor under the sanction of law is almost unknown. In Arthabaska, out of 18 municipalities there has not been a drop of liquor sold under the law or a single license issued except in two. In Megantic, out of 14 municipalities my impression is that the same thing is true, except in one | er. municipality. In Lotbiniere there is not a single license, and the same is true of Portneuf. (Cheers.) It remains to be seen whether the people there are in favor of a change and the plebiscite will show that. The plebiscite is part of the Liberal program adopted at the convention of 1893. Our policy has been before the people, who have pronounced upon it. It now becomes our duty to carry our our program, and I say frankly it is our intention to do so. (Cheers.)

As to the time when it should be done my answer is this: It is the intention of the Liberal party to carry out to the letter every article of its program within the very shortest possible limit. There is no intention to delay. On the contrary, speaking even politically, it is perhaps the best policy of all to deal with the question within the shortest time. It is not our intention this session, but I have every hope that next session and not later we shall introduce the legislation ve have promised. (Loud cheers.) This is a question in which the women are, I erhaps more than the men, interested. Lively Time at the Irish Convention-The Leader Sought Refuge in a Hotel to Escape From the Mob.

Dublin, Sept. 3 .- The third day's session of the Irish Race convention was opened to-day, Right Rev. Patrick O'Donnell. Bishop of Raphoe, presiding. Michael Davitt read messages from societies and individuals in New York, Queensland and elsewhere, expressing hopes that a complete union of the sections of the Irish party would be effected.

Dean Harls of Toronto protested against the conduct of a Dublin newspaper in describing Chevaller Hency, a Canadian delegate to the convention, as a companion of Le Caron, the spy and informer.

Canon McCartan supported a resolution setting forth that it was the prime duty of the Irish party to maintain its absolute independence of the English and to preserve its perfect freedom to oppose anything that the best interests of the National cause may dictate.


WANTED TO LYNCH DILLON.

Dublin Mob of 1000 Roughs Scared the Irish Leader Badly.

Dublin, Sept. 3 .- Following the adjournment of the Irish National Convention today there was almost a riot in Sackvillestreet, and John Dillon and a number of his friends were compelled to seek refuge in the Imperial Hotel. After leaving Leinster Hall, Mr. Dillon, escorted by fifty or sixty members of the convention, walked up Sackville-street, which was densely crowded. The delegates were followed by a noisy mob of about 1000 Dublin ruffians. wire had been guthered about the hall, and who were evidently not in sympathy with the Dillonites. The leaders of the mob kept shouting: "To - with Dilion." etc., and stones and other missiles begun flying through the air. To these cries the billonites replied by singing, "God Save Ireland," increasing the riotous demonstration and largely adding to the number of the mob following them up the street. The police on duty were not able to cope with the roughs and reinforcements had to e hurried to the scene. The police soon turned into Sackville-street in strong numbers, and were just in time to stop a growing riot which might have had most serious consequences, for there were threats of typehing, thrashing and ducking Dillon causing him and his party hurriedly to take refuge in the Imperial Hotel, which was afterwards surrounded by a strong force of police who kept the rioters at bay.
