Ircther Ekeleten Found Mr. David Boyle, curator of the Archae logical museum, unearthed another skeleton on an island in Rice lake on Wednesday. It is the most important find he has made and will tempt him to continue his examinations in that historic locality. While working in a mound a prehistoric skeleton was disclosed. It is likely that of a female, probably a princess of one of the Indian tribes, as around her neck were numerous strings of beads-a sign of rank. These beads form an important discovery. There were a number of costly necklaces. The first was of copper and shell. Below was one of salt water shells and then there were three strings of wampum beads. All of these are in good condition and are exceptionally valuable on account of their being of Indian manufacture. 
