**THE NOTORIOUS NO. 1 OF THE IRISH INVINCIBLES IS NOW IN A PRISON IN FRANCE**  
 An English Detective Nabbed Him at Boulogne While He was Standing as a Bar Expanding Fenian Idea—He Had Incriminating Papers on Him.  
 London, Sept. 13.—P. J. Tynan, the notorious "No. 1" of the Irish Invincibles, who was so frequently mentioned during the trial of the persons charged with the murder of Lord Frederick Cavendish, Chief Secretary for Ireland, and T. H. Burke, Permanent Under-Secretary, in Phoenix Park, Dublin, on May 8, 1882, was arrested at Boulogne, France, at 4 o'clock this morning on a warrant issued in 1882. Tynan is also charged with being concerned in the manufacture of dynamite bombs for use in England. It has been learned that he arrived in Europe in August, when he embarked at Genoa. He proceeded thence to Paris, where it is alleged he consorted with the Irish dynamite makers and the Fenians. On Friday he arrived at Boulogne and expanded Fenian views at the hotel bar. He had been watched since he arrived in France by an English detective, who, this morning, placed him under arrest. The officer pointed a revolver at his head and threatened to shoot him if he made the slightest resistance. Tynan was speedily secured. He subsequently admitted his identity. In his possession were found a considerable sum of money and a number of incriminating papers. He will be arraigned before a judge in Boulogne to-morrow with a view to securing his extradition. It is stated that his arrest is connected with the arrests of Bell and Wallace, the former having been captured in Glasgow and the latter in Rotterdam. The Times will say that Bell and Wallace are charged, with Tynan, in being concerned in a dynamite conspiracy.

**SAY SOME MEMBERS FROM ONTARIO**  
 A Caucus Made Necessary by the Little Differences in the Foid-Canada Sugar Refining Company Gets a Decision in the Exchequer Court—Ottawa Notes.  
 Ottawa, Sept. 14.—The Opposition are to hold a caucus to-morrow morning. There seems to be considerable trouble in the ranks. Nobody appears to know just what is going to happen, but there are sundry murmurings against the conduct of the session being left in the hands of Sir Charles Tupper, Mr. Foster and Sir Hibbert Tupper. These are all Maritime men, and the Ontario members do not relish their running the whole show, which, besides, has too much Tupper in it to suit the most of them. "There is nothing the matter with the Opposition," remarked an Ontario member of the Opposition this morning, "except that we need a leader and a definite line of policy. I cannot see that anything can be done this session, but next session I am going in for both a new leader and a new policy." This will give some idea of the feeling of the rank and file, and Messrs. Tupper and Foster may have found it expedient to consult their followers before going any further with their program. They made a mistake when they undertook to divide the House on the matter of Governor-General's warrants, and many members of the Opposition are of the opinion that such a blunder was enough to discredit any leader, and some doubts are being expressed as to whether it would be a great deal to the credit of the party to allow Sir Charles Tupper to vent his vindictive spirit against Lord Aberdeen in a form that would give him the credit of the entire Opposition. They do not relish the prospect of the Conservative party through its official leaders opening the Crown in this country, and while they do understand the feeling which Sir Charles Tupper must have in the extent that would make them cheerfully support such a motion as Sir Charles would introduce if he had his way. Some of the Conservative members are asking what good it would do now that the whole thing is over, and they are very much afraid that it would do a great deal of harm. The proceedings at the caucus to-morrow will probably be very entertaining, and if Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Foster do not get the desired results from the sore heads then current report is misleading.

**SALISBURY'S TURKISH POLICY.**  
 German Papers Don't Regard the Situation in the Ottoman Empire Seriously.  
 Berlin, Sept. 13.—Lord Salisbury's so-called independent policy in Turkey, which is doubtless seen in the action of Sir Philip Currie, the British Ambassador at Constantinople, in presenting to the Porte a note protesting against the Government's expulsion of Armenians from the Turkish capital without consulting the representatives of the powers, is not taken here so seriously as implying the appearance of a British fleet in the Bosphorus to enforce the special British demands, and the absence of several ambassadors from Constantinople ought to furnish sufficient proof of the suspension of the final Turkish crisis. Sir Philip Currie is the first ambassador who has had an audience with the Sultan since the recent riots in Constantinople. Baron Calice, the Austrian Ambassador, and M. Nilius, the Russian Ambassador, are down on leaves of absence which will not expire until the end of the month, and Sir Philip Currie in the meantime is in command of the British legation with whatever kind of isolated policy he has to push forward. No well-informed diplomat here believes that the British position is one of great advantage. The North German Gazette, whose articles on the Turkish situation are regarded as unimpeachable, says that the official opinion here, the other influential journals take an entirely different course.

**Apple Sauce that Will Keep.**  
 This is as great a convenience as preserving, the preparation of apples for sauce not being always convenient for the busy housekeeper. A fair apple may be used in this manner. The apples are washed, and when one is fortunate enough to own an orchard, will be found quite available. They should be peeled, cored and sliced, and then put in a boiler with quite small pieces. A large earthen jar with a cover should be ready to receive them. Into this put first a liberal quantity of sugar, then the apples, then a layer of apples, then more sugar and cinnamon and so on until the jar is full. The sugar should be regulated according to the tartness of the apples, from a quarter to a half pound for one pound of apples being the rule. The jar should be placed at the back of the range and the fruit kept covered and gently simmering through the day. It should then be set away to cool, and the apples taken out only as they are needed for sauce or dessert. Having no water mixed with them, apples prepared in this way are very palatable.
