The Terrible Fate That Overtook Leonard J. Grimshaw of London.

London, Ont., Aug. 26.-Leonard Grimshaw, a machinist, employed by E Leonard & Sons, was scalded from head to foot this morning at Watson's box factory, Bathurst-street. He was immediately taken to the city hospital, where he died at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The cap of the drip attached to the pipe used to conduct steam from the boiler to the engine blew out a short time after the engine was started. Grimshaw was standing right under the drip at the time and was covered by the condensed steam, to catch which the drip is built.
