The Local Militia Companies Left for Kingston This Morning. At an early hour Tuesday morning the Queen's square near the market, erjoyed somewhat of a military appearance, it being the meeting place for the 45th Battalion. About 8 30 the battalion bugle band, comprising six buglers and two drummers under command of Bugle Major Pepper, paraded up Kent-st. to the square. An hour's drill was then proceeded with to the G. T. R. station, headed by the battalion band, composed of 16 pieces, under command of Bandmaster Bate, with the bugle band and four companies of volunteers following.
