A Lunch Counter in the Mansion House.

Mr. W. A. Goodwin has men at work improving his building at the north west corner of Cambridge and Peel sts.

Mr. Chas. V. Bennett, of Omsene, has been appointed classical master at the Barrie Collegiate Institute at a salary of \$800 per annum.

Mr. P. B. McIlhenny, our local driver, shipped on Monday about two carloads of cattle and sheep to Montreal and other eastern ports.

Mr. John M. Walsh, of Duro township, has a very valuable bull stolen from him last week. The thief is thought to be a young man.

The roof of the Academy of Music has been repaired and other necessary improvements have been made preparatory to the fall and winter engagements.

A local chronic drunk has been reeling around the streets for the past two weeks and presents a most disgusting sight. This is a law to take care of such men.

The Gage, formerly of Peterboro and Bridgford, had both his legs severed in an accident on the railway near Hamilton last Friday. He is still living. Mr. Gage is known by many in town.

Jas. Black, a farmer near Cookstown, killed a horse last July by striking it with a rail. He was annoyed by the animal ever since and in a gateway. A few days ago a detective had him fined \$10 and costs for his cruelty.

Southville will proceed at once to put in a water works system, which will be instituted on the gravitation plan. The work will be done under the direction of the City Council, and will be completed by June next.

Mr. R. G. Cornell, insurance agent, has, we understand, bought the residence lately occupied by Mr. Gray at the corner of Albert and Fair-ave. at a very reasonable figure, and contemplates further improvements.

Mr. Albert J. Iveyman, has a very striking turnout, consisting of a coupe drawn by four handsome grey horses, driven by Mr. Iveyman.

Arthur Parkin wheeled from Bolton, 35 miles west of Toronto, on Sunday, his horse, a pair of mares, and left Lindsay at 11.5 p. m. and arrived at Lindsay at 7.15 p. m., making the run from Toronto in 3 hours.

A road wagon with suspension springs, very tastefully painted and neatly finished, which rides so easy that a rough road hardly noticed, has just been completed at Mr. Jas. Hamilton's Carriage Factory. The vehicle was sold to Mr. Albert Jewett before it was completed.

The fire in the new \$30,000 opera house, Barrie, Sa. Sunday night week was an expensive experience for the town, as it is believed that the fire was caused by the negligence of the by-law committee. The citizens now lament.

Mr. Wm. Kemp, near the Grand Trunk roundhouse, is about to have her house greatly enlarged and improved. She has let the contract for the carpenter work to Mr. W. J. Ruzick, Lindsay, Bro., who will do the masonry and brick work.

The Grand opera house, Barrie, erected at a cost of \$30,000 by ex-Treasurer Stanford, and confiscated by the Ontario government, was damaged by fire on Saturday week to the extent of several thousand dollars.

4,000 boxes of cheese sold on the Peterboro cheese board Thursday averaged \$1.25. A higher price was received by telegram, but under the circumstances was refused. The price of the cheese is falling, and it is believed that the price of such a bid would ruin the board.

Rev. James Kines, pastor of the Division St. Methodist church, Cobourg, held at Clinton Springs Thursday. He held many important pulpits in Ontario and Quebec. He was past master of the Independent Order of Oddfellows of Toronto.

As we predicted Mr. D. C. Trew has won a fair share of the prizes at the Toronto exhibition. Twelve birds were exhibited by him for which he captured nine prizes and a silver medal. He has been offered some fancy prizes for his birds, but has declined making a sale so far.

Street Overseer Walker has made an excellent job of lowering the stone curbs opposite the Banquet hall, and the corners of York and Kent sts. Lindsay and Kent-sts. require the same treatment before any further work is done on the street.

This is evidently a good year for the peach, but not particularly so for the grower, as they have become scarce on the market. Last Saturday evening in the city two baskets of peaches were offered for 25 cents in order to dispose of the supply on hand.

The Ontario Institute for the Deaf and Dumb will re-open on Wednesday Sept. 15th. Pupils from Lindsay, Kilmont, Fenelon Falls, and other points in the district are expected to connect with the morning train leaving Lindsay at 10.15 a. m. on that day.

Mr. R. Iwida, of the west end three stores, left Lindsay for the North-west several weeks ago. He now sends word that he is pleased with the country and has decided to take up 200 acres there. He has sent for his family, who will go next month, after visiting friends in Toronto, Midland, Fenelon Falls and Cambridge.

The large order received by Horn Bros. from the Dominion government for blankets for the North-west police, is nearly completed, and shipment will take place in a few days, the factory running overtime in order to complete the work, which has been arduous, owing to the extra weight required, being more than the average.

The San Jose scale is causing much loss in Eastern Ontario, where it is devastating the orchards. The pest's enormous capacity for reproduction, one female producing about 3,000 eggs, affording annually, makes it a terror to horticulturists. Our governments are doing well to diligently search for its beginnings, and to combat it as it gets a good start.
