MESSAGE FROM AGUINALDO

The Philippine Insurgent Chief Says He Has Confidence in the United States -Spain, Through the Peace Commission, Will Try to Retain the Islands - Has Germany Schemed?

London, Sept. 20 .- The Hong Kong correspondent of the Daily Mail says: The Philippine Congress has favorably impressed the Europeans who have witnessed the proceedings. It is believed that its deliberations will result in a petition to President McKinley to establish a protectorate. The attitude of the American army officers towards the insurgents is causing much unfavorable criticism among Europeans who have returned from Manila. Aguinaldo has obeyed every order, whether accompanied by threats or not.

Aguinaldo's Explanation. Manila, Philippine Islands, Sept. 20 .-The Philippine Government desires to inform the American Government and people that the many rumors circulated regarding the strained relations between the Philippine and American forces are base, malicious slanders of the enemy to both parties, are without any truth and are circulated for the purpose of prejudicing the appeal of the Philippines for their release from the oppression and cruelty of Spain. The relations of our people and yours have been and will continue to be of the most friendly nature, and we have withdrawn our forces from the suburbs of Manila as an additional evidence of our confidence in the great American Republic.

President Reads With Pleasure. Washington, Sept. 20.—The despatch conveying Aguinaldo's message to the American people was regarded with much interest at the White House. The President read the statement with evident appreciation of its importance, but did not volunteer any information as to the attitude of this Government. Officials very near him spoke of the message as a "very important document."

SPANISH PEACE COMMISSION

Instructed to Defend Retention of the Philippines by Spain.

London, Sept. 20 .- The Daily Mail's Madrid correspondent says a long conference was held between Senor Sagasta the Premier, and Senor Montero Rios, the President of the Spanish Peace Commission, yesterday, which resulted in the decision that the Peace Commission shall strengously defend the retention of the Philippine Islands by Spain.

Has Germany Been Scheming? New York, Sept. 20 .- A special to the Herald from Washington says: As an indication that Germany has been scheming to share in the disposition of the Philippines, the authorities have learned that, acting under instructions from Berlin, the German Commander-in Chief of the Asiatic station has made an exhaustive investigation of the coal deposits of the islands.
