LOCAL BREVITIES.

Town and County Items of Interest.
—Coal oil is advancing in price.
—The Esturion will continue here double trips till Oct. 1st.
—Quite a party of citizens left for Ottawa last Monday to visit the fair.
—Messrs. Spratt & Killen, of this town, will buy grain at Omemee this season. They have rented the Morrison warehouse.
—The plate glass in the window of Blackwell & Co.'s meat store was accidentally broken on Wednesday. It is insured and will be replaced at once.
—Mr. Glidden, of Toronto, solo conductor of the Grand and Princess theatres for the past several years, has accepted the position of leader of the Peterboro band.

—Oshawa council is having surveys and estimates prepared for a system of water supply and sewage disposal to cost about \$10,000. The water supply will be obtained from springs.
—We have received the prize lists of the Peterboro Central Exhibition and East Durham and Cavan Exhibition at Millbrook. The former offers \$5,000 in premiums and the latter \$1,400.
—The 17-month old son of Mr. Samuel Stead, of Dysart Station, Haliburton county, strayed from the doorway to the bank of the Burnt River the other day and was drowned.
—The ratapayers of Barrie have carried a by-law to raise \$35,000 to build a municipal electric lighting plant, and Campbellford council will install a street incandescent plant at a cost of \$5,000.
—The open season for partridges, hares, grouse, geese, and swans, snipe, woodcock and squirrels, has arrived and will continue to Dec. 15th, except in the case of geese and swans, in which it lasts until May 1st.
—Capt. Varcoe's enterprise in running the Maple Leaf in connection with Victoria Road fair met with a poor reward, as only about half-a-dozen of our citizens elected to make the trip by water.
—The public will be pleased to know that Mrs. J. Parker will again have charge of the dining-room at the fair grounds. She is the right woman in the right place, as she has how to provide a first-class meal and invariably does so.
—Mr. T. C. Matchett, C. P. R. ticket agent, with Mrs. Matchett and child, left town on Wednesday, Sept. 24, for Owen Sound, where they had arranged to take passage on a C.P.R. steamer for a trip up the lakes. T. C. has to a vacation—the first in two years.
—For some years past diphtheria has been more or less prevalent in certain districts in Haliburton county, and it is now reported that the dread disease has again broken out in Carleton Place. It is reported that the health board of Carleton Place has issued a circular to the health board of Lindsay, Ontario, dated Sept. 21st, in which it is stated that the health board of Carleton Place has received a telegram from Tuesday, from Morden, Man., stating that his sister, Mrs. Benjamin Conel had died at that place. —The Merchants' and Buyers' Benefit Association is a concern which was introduced in Lindsay and elsewhere in Ontario some time ago, is alleged to be defunct. Of late the scheme has been run by a Toronto lawyer, who has dropped \$1,200 trying to bolster it up.
—There is a rumor that the Canadian Pacific will put into effect the western rates previously used by the American lines. The rate was \$1.00. This would make their tariff \$7.50 higher on first and \$5 higher on second-class tickets than it was before.
—The Ladies Aid of the Midland Methodist church will hold their annual excursion to Port Hope on Sept. 30th and Oct. 1st. Tickets good going Friday p.m., or Saturday a.m., returning Monday, Oct. 3rd. For full particulars see posters at G.T.R. agents. Mrs. S. Vryvan, Secy.
—The Grand Trunk have issued a circular restoring the former rates to the West from all stations in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, and New York, to go into effect on Sept. 23rd. The word has yet been received as to the restoration of local rates, but it is expected that some announcement will be made in a few days.
—Rev. Hannibal Goodwin, a poor Catholic priest of Newark, N.J., has after twelve years' fighting in the courts proved that he was the inventor of the Kodak film, much used for photographic purposes throughout the world. He filed a suit in Newark on Sept. 13th, claiming \$100,000 for every spool turned out, which will mean an immense fortune.
—"Gough is stripping his block of its linen duster and is going to put on a winter coat," remarked a citizen one day recently as he watched men busily at work taking down the cotton signs that have enshrouded the upper part of the building for some months. The canvas was built in sections and will be stored away to reap next summer in some other kind of striking advertisement.
—There has been friction for some time past between Cobourg town council and Mr. J. E. Moffett, owner of the town waterworks system. The town has been paying \$3,000 per year for the use of the water works, and the council, considering the amount excessive, threatened to contract for a new service from Baltimore. A preliminary survey was made and tenders submitted for waterworks for \$100,000, which would reduce the yearly charge from \$3,000 to \$2,300, and granted additional privileges equal to a total reduction of \$1,000 per annum.
—"A Man from Mars," is the catchy title of a very interesting novel just published by Mr. C. M. Ellis, of Toronto, and now being placed on the market. It is from the pen of our gifted citizen, Mr. Wm. McDonnell, author of "Exeter Hall," "Heathens of the Heath," and other novels that have attracted considerable attention in the literary world. "A Man from Mars" deals with the social conditions of the day, and describes a visit to the planet Mars and the ideal measures there adopted for the amelioration of poverty and distress.
