MUNICIPALITIES ARE ACT VE They Now Appreciate the Importance of Good Roads.

Mr. A. W. Campoen, provincial road instructor, has been informed that the council of Parry Sound have purchased a complete outfit of road-making machinery, and will proceed immediately to construct a macadam road from that town to Parry Harbor.

The city of Chatham had begun the construction of macadam roads on an extensive scale. Mr. Campbell superintended the building of the first macadam street that was laid down there. Mr. Campbell goes to Pelee Island to inspect the condition of the roads, and to address a meeting on the importance of good highways, on 29th

The provincial road instructor is just completing a report he is preparing for the Windsor city council, in which he recommends the construction of brick pavements on the main streets and macadam on the remainder.
