Canada's Marvellous Development Under Liberal Rule. HON. SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT

A Great Speech in Which He Proves the Wisdom of the Present Administration of Dominion Affairs—Liberal and Conservative Expenditures Compared—Economy in Controllable Expenditures.

Toronto, Aug. 25.—Last night Massey Music Hall was crowded with a remarkable representative audience drawn from Manitoba to the Bay of Fundy. The town delegation was remarkable, but that from out of town was wonderful. The chairman, W. H. Mulholland, opened the night with a quartet to 'O'Clock.

Sir Richard Cartwright rose to reply to the cheering and to the applause of the audience, and he said: 'What are you going to do with the sixty-nine millions?' which elicited from Sir Richard the remark: 'Mr. President, I have no objection to my satisfaction before I conclude—that is to say, if he is one of those who is capable of being satisfied.'

Britain now has the lion's share of China's foreign trade, and she is jealously watching her rights in that quarter.

HOGG BROS., Oakwood. Windor, N.S., Aug. 25.—Senator William Temple of Fredericton, N.B., died at Falmouth at 7 o'clock last evening. The remains will be forwarded to Fredericton by train this morning. Hon. Thomas Temple was the son of Charles Temple of Brampton, Oxfordshire, Eng. He was born at Brampton, Nov. 4, 1818, was educated at a common school in England and came to New Brunswick in 1832. He was married in 1842 to Susannah, daughter of Solomon Howe of Southampton, N.B. He served in the York Light Dragoons during the troubles in regard to the boundary line between N.B. and the State of Maine in 1838. He was high sheriff of the County of York from 1864 to 1883. He was first returned to Parliament at the election held Jan. 29, 1884, to fill the seat vacated by the death of J. B. John Pichard. He was re-elected at the general elections of 1887 and 1891, and continued to sit in the House of Commons until called to the Senate, April 23, 1896. Senator Price Very Low. Quebec, Aug. 24.—Hon. 6,000 HARVESTERS. A Collingwood Man on the Manitoba Harvest Excursion Walked Off the Train to His Death. Winnipeg, Aug. 26.—More harvesters arrived from Ontario yesterday, completing the ten train loads expected. An excursion special of the C.P.R. was made up to accommodate the harvesters, who will add nearly 1,000 laborers to the 5,000 already arrived. A fatal accident occurred yesterday morning on the first of the harvesters' excursion specials at Bon Heur, 130 miles west of Fort William, an old colored man named Willis Bolton being the victim. Bolton walked off the end of the train while it was going at a good rate of speed, and falling on his head, broke his neck. The C.P.R. sent an engine back from Rat Portage with a doctor, but the man was dead before medical attendance could reach him. Bolton had been a resident of Collingwood for some years. In addition to the above a passenger told a reporter of four fatal accidents reported on the way out. Two men gathered huckleberries and a brakeman were run over, and one of the passengers struck his head against a projecting rail while he had his head through the car window. General Superintendent Osborne of the C.P.R., when questioned, said he knew nothing whatever of the three latter accidents, and the first was not fatal. The report that Anderson, the alleged bank thief, threatened the life of Detective Davis, is denied. Anderson's jail will be fixed to-day.

ONTARIO RIFLE MATCHES. The Week's Shooting at the Long Branch Range Closed. Toronto, Aug. 26.—The second stage of the Corporation of the City of Toronto match was shot off yesterday at the Long Branch Range, and Sergeant W. Swaine of the P.W.O. headed the list and received the gold medal and \$25. The Goswami competition for skirmishing and firing the 4th Battalion carried off the palm and were accordingly awarded the handsome challenge cup and \$40. The 1st P.W.O. came second, receiving only six points behind the first team. A revolver match was also held. The shooting continued throughout the week and the finals were shot off yesterday.
