Lindsay's New Elevator.
Contractor McGeough has been using all possible expedition in the work of fitting up Mr. P. J. Hurley's new 40,000 bushel elevator, and hopes to be able to take in grain for a trial run on Monday next. The requisite machinery arrived on Monday, being supplied by the Goldie & McCullough Co., Galt, and is now being placed in position. Power will be furnished by a ten h. p. electric engine, which is now being installed by the Lindsay Light, Heat and Power Co. The scale hopper has a capacity of 40 bushels of wheat. The metal plates with which the outside of the elevator is sheathed are on here, but will only be placed on the lower portion of the structure—the first story—at present, as it is expected that the upper portion will settle considerably in the course of the next month, and if the metal sheathing was in position it would wrinkle badly as a result of the contraction. A gentleman connected with the new elevator at Midland, who was in town last Friday, says Mr. McGeough has reason to be proud of the manner in which he has carried out his contract. Mr. P. J. Hurley thinks so, too.

Flavelle Bros. took 430 boxes into their warehouse.
—The fine dining-room of the Simpson house is being repaired and will present its best appearance during the fair. Miss host Simpson has decided to cover the floor with a hand-ome carpet later on. In these and other ways he is increasing the popularity of his comfortable house with the travelling public, as well as our townpeople.
—The first shipment of excelsior from the Rider & Kitchener factory was made on Saturday. The machines will have to be run to full capacity to fill accumulated orders. The work of fitting up the other departments is progressing satisfactorily, and the various lines are very bright.

Hayes, of Peterboro and Lindsay, for injuries received through falling into a hole near the market building during the construction of the cement walk on that street, was settled out of court last week.
