Ottawa, Oct. 15 .- It will be remembered that during the past summer master-General of New Zealand, visited Canada, and on behalf of his Government signed jointly with Sir Mackenzie Bowell and Mr. Foster a memorandum respecting improved commercial relations and reciprocal tariff regulations, as agreed upon in conference, held informally in Ottawa 10th June, 1895, subject to approval of Governments and Legislatures of Canada and New Zealand respectively. MR. LAURIER'S TOUR. The Opposition Leader and His Friends Merrickville.

Merrickville. Ont., Oct. 15 .- Four brass bands from adjacent towns acc mpanied the Hon. Mr. Laurier and his friends to this place, arriving by special train from Smith's Falls at 12.50 p.m. A procession was formed to the drill shea, which was well filled. On the platform were seated Hon. Mr. Laurier, G. W. Dawson, M.P., Addington; Mr. McMillan, M.P., South Huron; Mr. F. T. Frost, A. Buchanan and the Liberal committee. The chair was taken by Mr. Heman McCrea, who made a short and very appropriate address, after which he

introduced Mr. F. T. Frost, the Liberal candidate for the riding. Mr. Frost congratulated the committee on the splendid demonstration and concluded a short address by ex-pressing his desire to be a faithful Hon. J. G. Ward, Treasurer and Post- supporter of the Hon. W. Laurier, whom he characterized as one of our ablest statesmen.

Mr. G. W. Dawson, M.P. for Addington, spoke for more than an hour on the trade policy of the Government. Mr. G. R. Putnam, secretary of the Liberal Association of the north riding of Leeds and Grenville, read an address of welcome to the Hon. W.

Mr. Laurier was received with applause from the members of his party. He congratulated the party on the st.ccess of the demonstration and hoped that after the next general election he would be able to welcome his friend Mr. Frost to the House of Commons as the member for this riding. Mr. Laurier said that he became a Liberal from the study of English history and the lives of Fox, Cobden, O'Connell, Bright and Gladstone. He then spoke of the tariff, trade, Government scandals and Manitoba school question, giving nothing new. On the school question he said that it was expected that in this riding he should speak at length on this question, and he did not shirk the duty of speaking here in the presence of all creeds and races. Mr. Laurier said that the people of Mani-toba had separate schools introduced among them some 30 years ago, which were repealed by the Manitoba School operation. He then quoted section 93 of the Confederation Act, going on to show that the minority had a right to appeal to the Dominion Government for redress and if he were a member of the Government he would use moral suasion and conciliatory means instead of remedial legislation. He was in favor of granting separte schools to the minority in Manitoba, providing that it could be brought about in a conciliatory manner. Mr. Laurier then went on to speak of depreciation in value of farm lands in this province and concluded an address of one and a half hours by expressing a desire that the electors of this riding would return Mr. F. T. Frost at the next gen-Mr. McMillan, M.P., of South Huron, spoke at considerable length in advocacy of free trade.

The meeting closed with the customary cheers.
