The entries this year were in excess of any previous year, all the classes being well represented. There never was such a showing of roots and vegetables, which were equally as good, and in some cases better, than those shown at the provincial exhibition. The ladies' work was the finest ever shown in the hall, and re flected great credit on the exhibitors. The showing of butter was also extra good. Eldon is noted for its good butter-makers, and the large tables full of exhibits of fine butter showed that in this line the township was keeping up to the mark.

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
