

The Channel Between the Bridges Widened and Deepened. The work of deepening and widening the river channel between the swing bridge and Wellington-st. bridge, and buttressing the north and south sides, will be com pleted Saturday eyening, and on Monday the government dredge will be taken to Rosedale to continue the excavation of the channel at that point. Immense quantitles of rock have been taken up by the powerful dredge, giving an almost uni-form depth of six feet between the two bridges, which is ample for all purposes. The increased width of the basin affords ample room for either the Crandella or the Esturion-our largest vessels-to turn and manœnvre without the slightest dif-ficulty or possibility of delay, so long as the rights of passenger boats are respected. It is generally admitted that Supt, Walters has accomplished a large amount of work for the sum placed at his disposal. There is still considerable dredging to
