Higher Mark Meached in San Francisco Than Bad Been Recorded in Phree Years-Foreign Bemand. San Francisco, Oct. 14.-Prices of wheat went up to a higher mark yes-on spot from 3 3-4c to 5c. These prices, which are 10c higher than at Chicago, are caused mainly by the heavy foreign demand and a rapid shrinkage of the available California wheat supply. The bulk of the demand comes from Great Britain, but what gives a speculative tone to the market is the uncertain element of East Indian and Australian consumption. It is reported that a third cargo is now being made up for India, and that in a few days several vessels un-der charter will be loaded for Aus-

tralla. It Kiffed Him This Time. Niagara Falls, N.
