R. SYLVESTER LOAN

EAST WARD RATEPAYERS FAVOR THE PROPOSITION.

Well Attended Meeting in the School House Last Friday Evening—Addresses by Messrs. Sylvester, Staples, Flavell, Mallon, O'Reilly, Crandell and O'Leary.

Mr. R. Sylvester was the first speaker, and his explanation of his reasons for asking a loan of \$20,000 was along the lines of his address at the town hall meeting, so freely reported in the Post.

Mr. Robt. Kennedy said he had given some consideration to the loan question when it was first mentioned, and had decided then that the proposition was calculated to advance the prosperity of the town.

Mr. Richard Wilkinson, of the east ward, took the floor as an opponent of the loan. He claimed that his business is in a prosperous condition, and that his staff has grown from 20 to 400 in a few years.

Another ratepayer had said to him, "Mr. Sylvester, when he gets the money, will skip out, and as his property given as security is only worth \$15,000 the town will be left \$5,000."

It was hardly probable, however, that property valued at \$40,000 would have to be sold for \$15,000, nor was it likely that Mr. Sylvester, with a flourishing business and fine prospects, would want to leave town.

In closing, Mr. Staples endeavored to make several points clear to the mind of Mr. Wm. Fee. The latter, when asked by the chairman if he was satisfied, replied in schoolboy fashion, "Oh, I don't know."

Mr. Wm. D. Flavell was the next speaker. He said he had explained his views very fully at the town hall meeting, but supposed that as a large ratepayer in the east ward he would be invited to take up a little of their time.

Mr. Richard Wilkinson, of the east ward, took the floor as an opponent of the loan. He claimed that his business is in a prosperous condition, and that his staff has grown from 20 to 400 in a few years.

Mr. Staples took occasion to explain that some ratepayers were still under the impression, despite all that had been said in the press and elsewhere, that Mr. Sylvester was asking a bonus of \$20,000.

Mr. John O'Reilly made a capital speech, marked by clear reasoning. Referring to the site granted to Sylvester Bros. 16 years ago, he said it had frequently been termed a "frog pond."

Mr. Wm. Fee—"Do you mean to say that the mortgage covers his house and everything?"

In reply, Mr. O'Reilly quoted the remarks of Mr. Hugh O'Leary, Q.C., and Town Solicitor Hopkins, at the public meeting, and said that under such a mortgage the town could even seize any money held by the borrower.

Mr. Sylvester had gone to Brantford and Mr. Richard Sylvester, after learning the facts, had been offered a bonus of \$40,000 if he would locate there and open the way clear for employment.

Mr. Hugh O'Leary was the next speaker. His opening remarks were devoted to a restatement of Mr. Wilkinson's statement that Mr. Sylvester's business was of no benefit to the east ward.

BRITAIN'S NEW ISLES

One of Them Is Toucouis, Which Is Without a History.

SURVIVORS OF THE SUBMERGED.

H.M.S. Mohawk's Amazing Cruise Among the Solomon Islands—Interesting Experiences of Officers and Men—Island of Motuitti Has Disappeared—Giant Race Not Down in the Books.

Vancouver, Oct. 10.—The following news was brought by mail steamer from Vancouver from the islands, which arrived on Saturday: H.M.S. Mohawk has returned to Sydney from the Solomon group.

An officer of the warship says: One of the most interesting features in connection with our cruise was a visit to Toucouis. This island is without a history. The people certainly are not Kanakas, woolly haired or stunted in stature.

During the cruise we anchored a volcano, at least it was a volcano island, on which at night, though no eruption, one could hear rumbling noises and see a glare above it. This was in the Santa Cruz group.
