ANOTHER MARINE DISASTER.

Margate, Eng., Oct. 18 .- The British ship Blengfell, Captain Johnson, from New York on September 19th for London, was destroyed by a sudden fire off this place early yesterday morning. Nine of her crew, including the captain and a pilot, perished. The survivors were laud-

The Blengfell was passing here in tow, on her way to London at about 6.30 a.m., and was about four miles off the coast. Suddenly she was enveloped in flames and smoke poured from her hatchways. Two lifeboats immediately put off to her assistance, but before they were able to reach the burning vessel her masts fell and she was burned to the water's edge. Her hull eventually drifted upon the Goodwin Sands.
