OUR FIRE BRIGADE.

In a recent communication in our columns Alderman Crandell underto condone the shortcom ngs of our fire brigade, and at the same time sought-somewhat unfairly, we th nk-to saddle the entire blame on our present council. We have had occasion to find fault with some of the acts of our aldermen this year, and may have to do so again, but we have no hesitation in saying that they are not entirely responsible for the unsat sfactory condition of our fire brigade-that is due to the negligence of councils for a number of years back.

The Underwriters Association began pressing for improvements in the brigade and equipment very soon after the completion of the waterworks, nearly seven years ago, and two years later the hook and ladder wagon was purchased at a cost of pearly \$500. Since then the vehicle has been a highly ornamental but eutirely useless appendage of the department, with the full knowledge of successive councils. It was known to all that discipline was being almost forgotten, that the brigade was without its proper complement of officers, that the apparatus was not kept in the best poss ble condition, and that the men were losing their smartness as a result of long-continued neglect of all forms of practise, yet matters were allowed to drift by each succeeding council, and it really seemed as if our representatives were afraid to meddle with the brigade. When Alderman Crandell was chairman of the fire and water committee, he did not display any more energy than his predecessors or successors an unaccountable feeling of inertia overlook all whose duty it was to take action.

Last year The Post again felt compelled to refer in somewhat severe term; to he state of the brigade and its studious neglect of practise and proper organization. As a result of our comments the council instructed the proper committee to consider brigade affairs and suggest improvements. The discovery was then made that the firemen had been following a set of obsolete rules framed years ago when the br gade's fire-fighting apparatus consisted of a hand engine and other crude appliances, and that a new by-law embodying modern rules, which was supposed to have been passed upon the completion of the waterworks, had not been signed by the mayor of that year, and being incomplete, the firemen had not been furnished with a copy of it. The committee resurrected the by-law and drafted some of the rules laid down therein into a new code, which was handed over to the council of 1899 for f nal amendment and adoption. Our aldermen neglected to act promptly, and their procrastination led, up to the miserable exhibition of incompetency so roundly condemned by the Underwriters' inspector, Mr. Howe, in a letter under date of July last, and read by Alderman Sootheran at

public meeting a couple of weeks ago. The present council deserves a share of the censure voiced by our citizens, and the firemen must shoulder a portion also. If they had grievances-and they appear to have hadthey should have been brought to the attention of council and people in more vigorous and earnest fashion; practically they were never heard of axcept when comment was made upon their slothfulness. Several of the firemen have informed us that on various occasions they advised members of council how to proceed to bring benefit of which the sewer was made about a better state of things, but

nothing was done. The fact is, the firemen have been afraid to express their honest opinion openly, and the councillors have been afraid to remove the stumbling block in the path of progress. That fear has lowered the brigade in the estimation of our citizens, and no doubt led to the defeat of the new fire hall scheme.

Just now the press of Toronto is criticizing its firemen, and is demanding the appointment of a new chief. Neglect of practise and consequent demoral zation is charged. In an article commenting upon Ald. Hanlan's suggestion that a gymnasium be fitted up in each fire hall the Star recently said: "Ald. Hanlan's plea for more phys -

cal exercise is very well as far as it goes, but it does not go far enough. The dumb bell and sparring exercise is all right in a large gymnasium, but you can't fight fire with dumbt bells or boxing gloves. It would be better to become accustomed to skipping up ladders, lifting them and scaling walls in a Streator Zouave fashion than to fool around a fire hall hoisting dumb bells up and down. More muscle is not more required by the firemen than I the octivity and a readiness to clamber ap walls and crawl up ladders under any circumstances. Practice in dummy fire fighting would both give the firemen exercise and train them in their trade."

SOUARE DEALING WILL PAY.

For years past the Rathbun Co's industry in this town has been one of the ch'ef mainstays of the working manbut for it fully 100 adults' and young men would have to leave town to secure employment, and many families would have to follow to jo'n the breadwinners. And this is not all business men would miss the sum paid out in wages, which will he Lout \$35,000 this year. While the company has been con-

fering this great benefit upon Lindsay, the town, through its council, has been displaying a miserable cheeseparng policy towards the firm by refusng to provide a couple of hydrants to safeguard the valuable property upon the security of which so many individuals depend for their bread and butter and ab lity to pay their taxes nto the town treasury. The promoers of new concerns find no difficulty n securing favors from the council, but the town's benefactor in time of need gets the cold shoulder. The hing's unjust, and it would be interesting to know the true facts concernng the opposition displayed by some members of council.

Our citizens will learn with interest that Manager Baker has rented Mr. J. A. Ellis' saw, and shingle mill at Fenelon Falls for the balance of the season. About twenty-five men will be employed. This step has been rendered necessary in order to keep up with the demand for stock, which unprecedentedly large. mand was foreseen last spring, when the mills here were enlarged and improved. How satisfactory it would be to our business men to know that another addition would be made this winter, and that 25 add tional men would be added to the pay-roll next season? Is the treatment meted out to the firm I kely to encourage the firm to confer this benefit upon Lindsay ?: The chances are that Fenelon Falls would vote substantial concessions provided the company would maintain a mill there and employ 20 or 25 hands. The money that would be paid over the counters of Fenelon Falls business men is wanted just as badly by our own merchants.

KNOTTY POINTS IN LOCAL

The proposed sewer on Cambridge and Wellington-sts. was petitioned for under the Local Improvement Act by the requisite number of ratepayers, and the council decided to construct the same. The Engineer reported that it was necessary to construct the sewer of larger capacity than required for the parties living on the street, so as to afford an outlet for parties living further up and would in time drain into it, and that the extra cost would be about \$3,000, and this amount, acting on the advice of Town Solicitor Hopkins, he assessed against all the properties in the south-west portion of the town which would eventually drain into this sewer. A court of revision was held last week to confirm the Engineer's assessment, when Mr. Hugh O'Leary, Q.C., on behalf of several ratepayers, appealed against the assessment, and objected, first, that the parties living off the streets where the sewer was to be constructed, had not petitioned for it, and if they were counted, then the petition was not properly signed; and second, that if they were liable they could only be assessed when they built their sewers and drained into it.

The Town Solicitor said the council only desired to do what was fair and right and to carry out the law; that the parties living on Cambridge and Wellington-sts., having petitioned for a sewer, and being willing to pay for it, were entitled to have it constructed; that the council would be exercising bad judgment and not doing their duty if they only constructed the sewer of sufficient capacity to serve those living on the streets, as the parties above could never get an outlet which was contrary to the policy of the law; that as the parties living on the streets were entitled to have the sewer, the parties above collaterally benefitted could not prevent them; and that as regards the time for payment, there was no reason why the parties living on the streets should pay the cost of the extra size which was not for their benefit; there was no power for the town at large to pay it, and he could see no other way but to assess the extra cost, in

sion decided to follow the Town Solicitor's opinion and leave it to Judge Dean to decide, and the matter was accordingly re-argued before Judge Dean, who, after carefully considering the matter, delivered an exhaustive judgment, dismissing the appeal, holding that the opinion of the Town Solicitor was correct on both points. Without expressing an opinion as to

the principle involved, we feel that the council should long ago have taken some steps to inform the public concerning sewerage matters. There is a general feeling that they went into the scheme with their eyes shut, hoping that it would turn out all right in the end. If they did give the matter full consideration, by shutting out the reporters they effectually excluded the ratepayers from all free information, and they should have issued a pamphlet giving the results of their

CANADAS CHEESE TRADE

In the course of his speech in Toronto recently, Mr. Foster, in his character of official opposition expert, undertook to produce figures to show the relative progress Canada had made in various directions during the eighteen years of conservative government prior to June 1896 and during the three years which have elapsed since. Among other items in a table of percentages, which was fearfully and wonderfully constructed, appeared cheese, the export of which, Mr. Foster assured his applauding audience, had decreased during the latter period, while it had increased under the for tering care of a conserve to government 9.000 The accuracy of the latter half of this statement may be judged by a reference to the Dominion year-boo's, which records the fact that, whereas in 1878 cheese exports amounted to about \$4,000,000, in 1896, they were less than \$14,000,000, an increas eof elss than 350 per cent. in 18 years, instead of 2,800 per cent. As to the "decrease" since the change of government, the figures for this year, just closed are over \$21,000,000 as against the \$14,000,000 for 1896, an increase of over 50 per cent.

The year just closed is the biggest and most promising in the history of the cheese trade, but the increase in the exportation of butter to Great Britain is far greater even than that In 1878 the total quantity of butter exported was but 13,006,626 lbs., in 1896 it had dropped to 5,889,241 lbs, or a genuine, not imaginary, decrease of about ,70 per cent. while for the current year about 20,000,000 pounds will be shipped to the British market. Of course August is the great shipping month, when more than 50 per cent. is sent out; for the month of August, ;1897, the shipment was 10,888 cwt., in August of last year, the shipments had grown to 15,736 cwt., but in August, 1899, the unprecedented total, 60,957 cwt., was reached, an average of about 100 tons a day. There can be no question about these figures, for they are prepared by the British Board of Trade, and no suspicion of partiality towards anyone can there-

The butter and cheese trade of Great Britain is worth looking after, for last year she imported 340,000,000 pounds of the former, of which Canada supplied less than 10,000,000 pounds; while she required 251,000,000 pounds of cheese, of which Canada sent more than half.
