The New Karn-Warren Organ H ard for the First Time-Over 1,000 Persons Pre-ent-De cription of the New

A recital was given on Tuesday evening at St. Andrew's church to inaugurate the new organ recently built for the church by the D. W. Karn Co., | friends. Limited, of Woodstock, the organist being Mr. William Reed, of New St. Andrew's church, Toronto.

Description of New Organ.

The instrument, although not large, is a very fine one, and contains some beautiful solo stops, especially the Clarabella and Clarionet on the Great organ, and the Flanto Traverso and Oboe on the Swell. The tone of the full Swell is rich without being rough; and the effect of the full organ is bright, with good power, and there is amentire ausence of coarseness.

The case is of dark quarter-cut oak, polished, the design being in keeping with the architecture of the church. In order to save choir space the case town at present. is curved out over the head of the player, a feature which adds materially to the beauty of the design. The front pipes are in gold, with a little decoration in blue and crimson to relieve it. The organ is blown by a Ross water motor, which works very smoothly and efficiently. Mr. Warren himself, has been here for the past few days superintending the finishing of the instrument. The following is the specification:

# He Will Labor in India.


