THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT AND THE TORY ORGANS.

An evidently organized band of tory

organs have during the past week or two presented an amazing and highly discredit able spectacle to the public of Ontario. For the purpose of making political capital against the Pri re Minister of Canada, and one of his colleagues-because they happen to be French-Canadians-they have embarked on a crusade of deliberate lying and slander in connection with the sending of a centingent of Canadian troops to South Africa, and have been acting more like howling dervishes, frothing with fanaticism. than sensible men awaiting the action of a government dealing with a new and difficult problem, and who have under the circumstances displayed commendable energy an promptitude. For grave Imperial official reasons it was not desirable to rush into print with an announcement as to the exact steps to be taken; but as appears from Mr. Chamberlain's letter, an understanding was arrived at and the Canadian government promptly acted upon the suggestions made by the War and Colonial offices in London All this was arranged in good time; but one or two unscrupulous tory organs, of the "yellow paper" class, rushed inco a tremendons display of what they call "loyalty", and followed this up by charging the Dominion government with disloyalty; and the lying brigade quickly spread the charges against the Lower Canadian cabinet ministers and the people of Lower Canada. There has been some diversity of opinion in Lower Canada, just as there has been in Ontario and in England as to the wisdom and justifiableness of resorting to war against the Boers; and this difference of opinion has been shared in by conservatives as well as liberals. But no one in the old country has wentured to charge Sir Wm Harcourt, or John Morley, or several tory M.P's., with high treason because they happened to disagree with Mr. Chamberlain's method of dealing with the Transvaal problem.

And no one would have attacked the Dominion government, but the opportunity appeared for a few days to be a good one to stir up prejudice against the French portion of our population and against Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte. That game has been tried several times, but the miserable failures of the past have not deterred these reckless tory organists and politicians from one more attempt—an attempt which Toronto Saturday Night properly condemns as "infamous', and which the Globe declares to be "a deplorable exhibibition," "A "more reckless, a more unscrupulous, a "more shameful campaign", continues the Globe, "was never waged against a govern-"ment charged with heavy responsibilities "and endeavoring earnestly to do its outy."

The organized lying brigade not only endeavored to make it appear that Canada was to be hindered and hampered in its military contribution to the Empire for the Transvaal campaign by "French domination" represented by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte, but they have endeavored to make capital against the government, and find another instance of French domination because the plans and conditions for the Canadian forces, as cabled by Mr. Chamberlain for the War office, did not coincide exactly with their particular plans for providing the contingent and carrying on the campaign.

FATALITY AT MUD LAKE BRIDGE

James T. Flaherty, an Emily Farmer Met a Fea ful Death on Saturday Morning He was Thrown from His


