ONTARIO W. C. T. U.

Report of the Meeting held at Belleville. [By a Lindsay delegate.] According to appointment we attended the fifteenth annual convention of the W. C. T. U., held in Belleville during the last week of October. At the outset it may not be amies to make a few general remarks. From what we saw and heard we be-

lieve the Woman's Caristian Temperance organizations with which this earth is blessed. Our field of labor is the world. Our total membership is 200,000. In this, our own Dominion, we are 7,000 strong. In Ontario there are 3,766 paying members, 485 honorary members, besides 7,346 Bands United States, \$7 215 000,000; and other of Hope children, altogether making a total of 11 607. The work includes twentyone distinct departments. From what we saw and heard we deem it a great privilege, a pleasure and an honor to attend such an assembly. In comparing the work done by this union with that of other unions it appears we are far, far from where we might be. And what is the reason? One reason seems to be our neglect to get and use the annual reporte; another is not taking the Woman's Journal, the official organ of the W. C. T.U. in Canada.

And worst of al', many of us do not give

to this great work the time and attention we should. It often takes second or third place, and sometimes no place at all, when compared with the work of other societies In order that the work done by every other Christian or benevolent society may whole influence against the curse of our land and of all lands. Is it not a fact that sometimes the same vessel that bears away the missionary has on board the rum cask and whiskey barrel? Is it not possible that the same lips that repeat the golden tex: in Sunday school class may have smacked over the brandy sauce at dinner? Is it not possible that many children in the Sunday schools may have come from homes where alcoholic liquors are used as household remedies for all aliments, from a morquito bite to a cancer? Would it not be absord fectants in our parlors and attics while there was a cesspool at our doors, sending forth the germs of diphtheria or typhold fever? And still the saloon is sending forth a more deadly influence. Can we, as citimen of this Dominion afford to be haifhearted or indifferent towards this great work? We pity, we sympathize with the women of India, China and Japan. That is perfectly right, but at the same time let us not forget that many of the fathers, the husbands and the sons of our land occupy just about the lowest level of humanity by induiging in strong drink. We now give our report, which is merely a synopsis of the proceedings at Belleville, Ostober 25:h. The convention met in the Royal Templars' hall, President Mrs. Cavers in the chair. 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
