The Price of Bread. (To the Editor of the Post.) DEAR SIR, -As a "Citizen" and a bread buyer I offered in your issue of the 14th inst. some data by which the consumer of bread could come to some conclusion as to the actual profit made by the baker. I gave these figures as a standard, and from them the price of flour or bread may vary, but vary as they may plus or minus the figures there given will make anyone aware of the profits to each party named and the loss to the consumer. "Laborer" hazards a reply and correction. No one of sound sense will believe other than that "Laborer" is a party interested-a baker or a miller; and in either case endeavoring to argue in self interest. This I should not, I do not, complain of. As being one of the many who buy bread I give particulars which are in the interest of the consumer. I did not wish to take any undue advantage, I quoted from their own authority, "The Milling World" a paper published in their interest, certainly not in mine; I took flour at \$5 a barrel, whereas it was actually \$4 40; I allowed \$2 as covering rent, taxes, and other expenses; I gave 4 1/2 bushels of wheat as being required to make a barrel of flour, and did not mention the bran and middlings which the miller discards, so that I did not cut fine; and then these figures were copied into the Chicago Tribune; they were not contradicted, they do not allow of contradiction and when I wrote "I learn on good authority I certainly meant it. I ask serious considera-

tion of the figures given and defy "Laborer" or any other party to successfully question them. Let everyone carefully figure for themselves, and they will see that the bakers are making more than legitimate profits, and house-holders will soon learn that they can save money in making their own bread. -Yours truly, CITIZEN, Lindsay, Nov. 16th, 1892.

VICTORIA FALL ASSIZES.

Following is a list of the cases tried at the fall assizes held last week, Judge Falconbridge presiding:

CIVIL CASES. PRING V. JONES.-An action of slander brought by Wm. Pring of the township of Dyers against Wm. Jones, it being alleged that the defendant had circulated a report about the plaintiff that he had stolen the defendant's hat. The jury gave a verdict for the plaintiff for \$20, and judgment was signed for full costs. Mr. Barron, Q.C., for the plaintiff; McSweeney & Anderson for the defendant.

BANKER V. BROWN.-Action to recover damages for the seduction of the plaintiff's daughter by the defendant, who pleaded that he was not the father of the child born to her. Verdict for the plaintiff for \$500 damages and costs. D. R. Anderson (McSweeney & Anderson) for plaintiff; J. J. McLaughlin for defendant.

SIMPSON V. MINK.-Action to recover \$1,000 damages for slander by the plaintiff under the Ontario statute of 1888. The plaintiff accused the defendant of stating that she was a woman of immoral character. The defendant pleaded the truth of the statement in mitigation of damages. Verdict for the plaintiff for \$1,000 damages. F. D. Moore (Moore & Jackson) for plaintiff; H. K. Anderson (McSweeney & Anderson) for defendant.

WESSE V. O'NEIL.-Action to recover \$350 interest under a mortgage held by plaintiff upon lands of the defendant in the township of Ossington. The defendant contended that he had paid the amount due to the plaintiff to his solicitor and agent, and that the mortgage was discharged. The plaintiff denied the agency of the solicitor to receive the money and denied having released the mortgage. Judgment received for John McSweeney (McSweeney & Anderson) for plaintiff; R. J. McLaughlin for defendant.

QUEEN V. JACKETT.-The prisoner was indicted to do bodily harm upon one Davis, a resident of Fenelon Falls. It appears that Jackett struck Davis with a stone, breaking his arm and inflicting a very serious wound. The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and sentenced Mr. M. U. Cameron for the crown; Mr. Barron, Q.C., for the prisoner.

CRASER V. PHILLIPS.-This was an action upon a contract for the sale of a farm. The plaintiff, Wm. H. Bennett of Midland, for the defendant.

LINDSAY V. LINDSAY.-This was an action brought by one Richard Lindsay to set aside an agreement whereby he agreed with his son, James Lindsay, to give him certain farm property in that town ship, the said agreement being in part to maintain the said James Lindsay in the township of Fenelon Falls. The plaintiff set up that the said James Lindsay had fallen in his part of the contract, and that the defendant had received the money paid to him by the plaintiff. Judgment for the plaintiff; Mr. Barron, Q.C., for the defendant.

POWERS V. DEWANT.-This was an action brought by the widow of the late Thos. Powers to have the estate of her husband administered by the court. The defendant, James Dewant, who was the executor of the late Thos. Powers, pleaded that he had administered the estate of the late Thos. Powers, and that he had paid the money due to the plaintiff. Judgment for the plaintiff; Mr. Barron, Q.C., for the defendant.

MARK V. GRAND JURY PRESENTMENT. May it please your lordship, The grand jurors of our sovereign lady the queen assembled at the court of assize for the county of Victoria, beg to make their presentment as follows:

Circles on the terrestrial globe. 8. Fractions and compound rules.

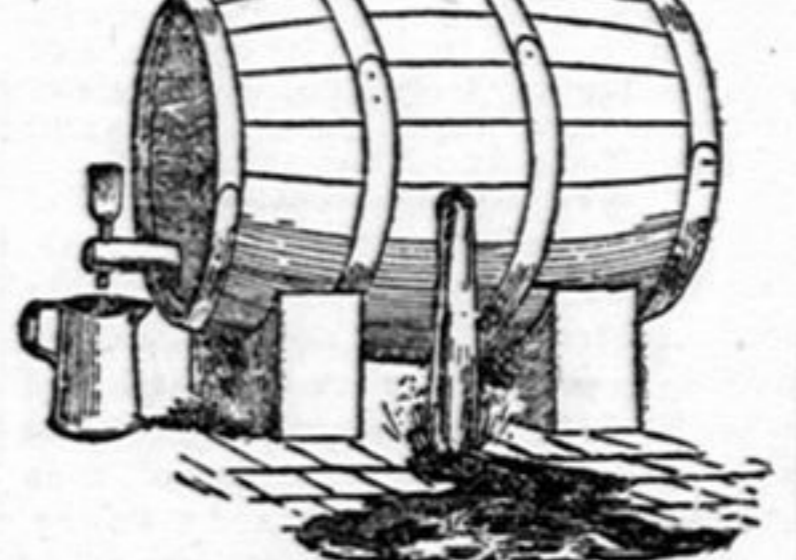
