[To the Editor of THE POST.] DEAR SIR,-As a "Citizen" and a bread buyer I offered in your issue of the 14th irst, some data by which the consumer of

from them the price of flour or bread may wary, but wary as they may plus or minus the figures there given will make anyone aware of the profits to each party named and the loss to the consumer. "Laborer" hazards a reply and correction. No one of sound sense will believe other than that "Laborer" is a party interested-a baker or a miller; and in either case endeavoring to argue in self interest. This I should not, I do not, complain of. As being one of the many who buy bread I give particulars which are in the interest of the consumer. I did not wish to take any undueadvantage, go home the harness was missing. Jones, it being alleged that the defendant had circulated a report about the plaintiff that the plaintiff had stolen the defendant's hay. WEESE V. O'NEIL.-Action to recover \$350 and interest under a mortgage held by plaintiff upon lands of the defendant in the township of Ops. The defendant contended that he had paid the amount due the plaintiff to bis solicitor and agent, and that the mortgage had been discharged. The plaintiff denied the agency of the solicitor to receive the money and denied hav ing signed the discharge that had been registered and the receipt of the money. Judgmen reserved. QUEEN V. JACKETT.—The prisoner was indicted with having committed an assault with in tent to do bodily harm upon one Davis, a resi dent of Fenelon Falls. The sction was dismissed with costs, upon the payment of which, however, the defendant (the son) volunteers to release all his claims upon the land of the plaintiff. G Cameron, esq . for his courtesy in assisting us with the several indictments brought by him before us, on this his first visit to our county; oping the great Architect of the universe may long spare you both to fulfil the duties appertaining to the very responsible positions you have been appointed to fill in this province. We are pleased with the prompt action of our county treasurer in placing a clock in the court room, as suggested by your lordship. We have examined the gaol and were very much pleased with the manner in which it is cared for by Mr. Jackson, the gaoler, there being at present confined therein, only three persons, confined as vagrants The collegiate institute being largely supported by provincial and county funds, we have made an official visit
